One of the big secrets in operating a successful restaurant, people in the know say, is to keep the premises small and exclusive.

The customers then will trample one another to get inside.

Perhaps, this theory can be applied to major league baseball. Take Montreal Expos and their diminutive Jarry Park for example.

The park, erected hastily to accommodate Montreal's sudden entry into the National League in 1969, seats only 23,456 - by far the smallest in the league. The next smallest is Wrigley Field, long-time home of the Chicago Cubs, which can handle 36,644.

But despite the park, which major league owners

previously would have considered too small, the Expos drew 1,424,683 fans last season. This was far above that of a dozen National and American League franchises, equipped with more spacious parks.

Charles O. Finley, owner of Oakland Athletics of the American League which drew far fewer fans than the Expos with a much larger park, visited Montreal last season.

He said he was impressed with Jarry Park, because of its intimacy and the close contact fans had with the action on the field.

Other owners and officials also have been impressed. Now they are having second thoughts about the desirability of building parks that can seat 50,000 to 70,000 fans.

One example of a large ball park that is working against attendance is Municipal Stadium, home of the AL Cleveland Indians.

Seating capacity is 76,977. Cleveland Browns of the National Football League fill the stadium, but the Indians don't.
