Every European country has many special ways to prepare pork chops, so it was difficult to choose just four recipes from the many. However, those that we have chosen are unique and all are popular in a different European country, although we have adapted them slightly for Canadian use.

The Pork Chops Russe recipe was brought to Canada by an immigrant from White Russia many years ago. They are breaded chops, but with a difference, because you marinate them in vinegar before breading. The Polish, Venetian and French recipes can all be used for either loin, rib, shoulder or butt chops. The Polish style chops are braised in a mixture of tomato sauce, sherry and sour cream, then garnished with dill. The Venetian style chops are breaded, then oven braised in a typical Italian sauce made from tomatoes, onion and green pepper. The French style chops are simmered in a wine and vegetable sauce that makes them quite special.

So, if you can't go to Europe this season, why not

try a little European cooking right here at home.

PORK CHOPS
 4 or 5 loin pork chops, about 1 - inch thick; 1/2 cup white vinegar; Flour; 1/2 teaspoon salt; Few drops of Worcestershire pepper; 1/4 teaspoon paprika; 1 teaspoon parsley flakes; 3 tablespoons vegetable oil.

Place chops in a dish and add the marinade. Marinate at room temperature for 1 hour, turning a couple of times. Then drain and pat dry with paper towels. Dredge with flour then dip in egg which has been beaten with a little water. Coat with crumbs and seasonings. Cook in hot oil for 10 minutes.

Heat oil in a skillet. Add chops and cook on each side for 4-5 minutes. Then lower cover, and cook slowly about 45 minutes or done. Add a little water to the pan if necessary to prevent sticking and the chops once uncovered for last 5 minutes cooking time.

Makes 4 or 5 servings.

blackmail demands on the government during the past few months - Canada will never be the same again.

The question in many people's minds is - will this transition from "the age of political innocence" make any form of protest impossible or difficult in the future?

The War Measures Act, invoked by the federal government to stop full-scale insurrection and possible bombings in Quebec, shocked nearly all Canadians.

Some saw it as a government panic - but many saw it as an unavoidable curb on the rights of the individual to be replaced by new emergency legislation which would not so drastically take away

citizen's rights in any future crises.

Unfortunately some Canadians welcomed the War Measures Act with open arms and shrilled that they would like to see it used to put down all forms of political protest.

This kind of thinking could kill democracy. Canada has cherished greater freedoms than citizens of most other countries. Such a spirit of liberty must not be swept away in an orgy of vengeance because one group turned terrorist.

It is to keep such terrorism from erupting again that the lines of communication must be kept open to the needs and wishes of all groups in our society.

Democracy must hang on a delicate balance in order to allow all people to be heard. Minorities must be able to hope that some of their wishes will be met without violating the rights of the majority. If this balance is lost - freedom is lost.

The FLQ serves notice on all Canadians and all Canadian politicians that they must listen more closely to the poor, the desperate and the dispossessed - and take action on their needs - housing, employment and the quality of life - before there is a blow up. It is their violence which we must abhor, but we must not forget to do something about their feeling of despair and hopelessness.

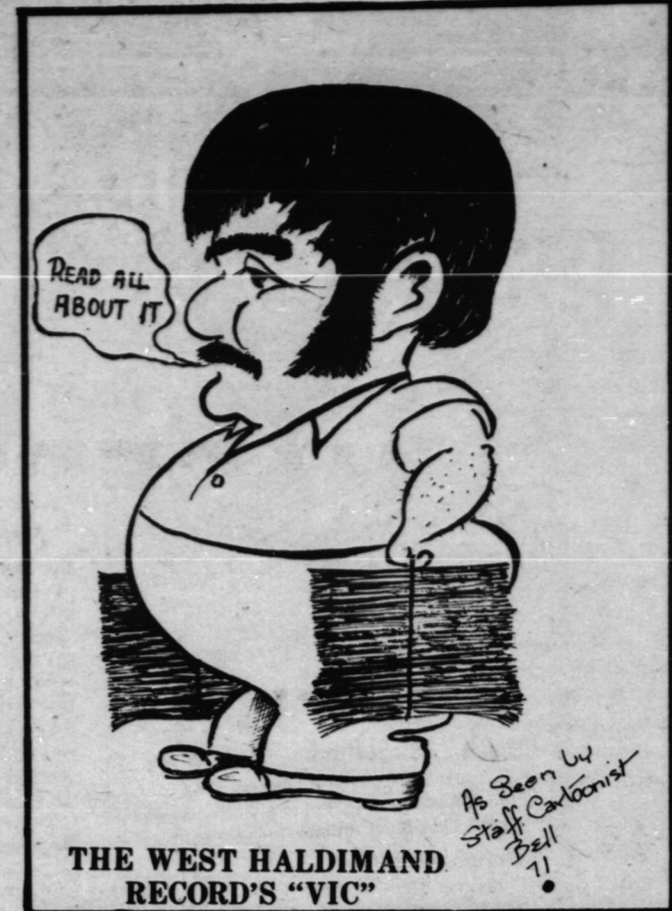

HSS Students Where Do You Stand?

There are 30 days of classes left for students at Hagersville Secondary School, not many for those who have work to do to prepare for final examinations, which start on June 11.

Last week the third report card of the year went home with all students. The mark given this term is an average of all work done this term and the mark given in January. Any mark which went down five percent should be looked at carefully, as it represents a poor term and possible trouble ahead.

Students who have worked consistently and have achieved at least 60 percent in a subject will have earned the privilege of not having to write the final examination in that subject. Those who stop working, or who have been inconsistent, will be asked to write the final examination, regardless of their mark, to prove to the teacher that they know enough about the subject to go on to the next year.

Students will be given one credit for each subject successfully completed. Twenty-seven credits are necessary to gain a Secondary School Graduation Diploma, normally achieved in four years.

An unusual broadcast was heard on the Lutheran Hour Program on Easter Sunday, April 11. The special program included a dramatic episode showing how one man came to understand the real meaning of Christ's resurrection in his life.

Comments by Dr. Oswald Hoffmann also were featured in the program. This program was well received by the millions who heard it in the 41 different countries the Lutheran Hour is broadcast.

Study Chinese

VANCOUVER (CP) - Students will have an opportunity this year to study the Chinese language in Vancouver schools. The city school board has approved a pilot course in Mandarin Chinese to be offered to grade nine students in the fall. The board approved the project with a mention that it might be expanded and offered later in five schools with a

substantial Chinese population. Trustee Fritz Bowers said: "It's ridiculous that we haven't recognized the Chinese community earlier. They have made great contributions to our community."

The course will probably be offered at Britannia senior secondary school - and offered later to the other schools.

The course was proposed after a citizen urged the board to start one for the 40,000 Chinese in the city as well as for those who wish to learn about the language and culture of the world's largest single ethnic group.
