Fresh Sunblushed Peaches Make Summery Cream Pie



If you had been a hostess in Queen Victoria's time, you might have ended a high fashion dinner in great style by serving each guest a single fresh peach in a nest of snowy white wool. The peach would have cost \$5.00, an exotic rarity. Today fresh, sunblushed peaches are for everybody. They're in good supply at market, and they taste particularly fine in a home-made Peach Cream Pie. It's a luscious, light as air affair, fresh and fragrant with the summer's delicious golden gems from Peachland U.S.A. This pie is easy to make ahead and chill in the refrigerator 'til serving time.

Peach Cream Pie
1 cup diced peeled peaches
1/2 cup sugar, divided
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
1 envelope unflavored gelatine
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
2 egg whites
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
1 baked 9-inch pastry shell
Additional peaches for garnish

Sprinkle diced peaches with 2 tablespoons sugar and lemon juice; set aside. Reserve 4 tablespoons sugar. Mix remaining sugar, gelatine and salt in small saucepan. Stir in milk and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatine dissolves, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat; add vanilla and almond extract. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture is the consistency of unbeaten egg white. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Add reserved 4 tablespoons sugar gradually, continuing to beat until stiff. Drain peaches and add to gelatine mixture. Fold in beaten egg whites, then whipped cream; turn into baked pastry shell. Chill until set, several hours. Garnish with additional peaches, peeled and sliced, just before serving. Makes: 6 to 8 servings.

More To Offer

EDMONTON (CP)—Art is the subject where children are really let loose and enjoy themselves in school, says Dr. Murray MacDonald of the University of Alberta's faculty of education. It has more to offer a child than any other school subject and should be more than just an exercise in drawing or painting, he told a teachers convention. Teaching children to observe and develop their perceptive abilities should be the prime aim of the art teacher, he said.

Dentists Prepare Wise Denticare Plan

The Ontario Dental Association, (ODA) representing the province's 3,300 dentists, has wisely accepted the inevitability of public dental insurance and presented a plan to put it into effect by gradual stages.

Denticare in one form or another is inevitable in the 1970s, according to Dr. Lionel J. Schiller of Windsor, this year's ODA president of the ODA. Because introducing universal denticare at one time would place an unbearable demand on present facilities, the ODA has designed a plan to begin coverage with children and gradually extend to all Ontario citizens.

The association is right in its assessment that public dental assistance is coming. Hospital and medical insurance are the certain signposts of the future for denticare. It is also correct in its stand that immediate universal coverage would be disastrous. But its suggestion for the planned phasing-in of denticare is too indefinite or too slow.

The ODA suggests beginning denticare with three-year-olds, on a plan that would provide coverage of each succeeding group for life and take in a new group each year as a new group reaches the age of three. On this basis, denticare would not become universal through the province until the first group of three-year-olds had reached old age. The obvious answer is to extend coverage gradually as experience dictates, reaching older groups as quickly as possible.

With medicare, the greatest demands tend to come from older groups, more prey to ill health. In denticare, the opposite is the case: dental care should begin early, with the emphasis on the preventive dentistry which the ODA very properly stresses. This fact is justification for beginning denticare for the young, although it should be extended as quickly as possible.
