Cayuga Speedway

CAYUGA, Ont. - The officials of Cayuga Speedway are contemplating changing the name of their race plant to Reimer Raceway after last Friday night's 25 lap Late Model Super Stock Feature event! Ken Reimer of Oakville, Ont., virtually unbeatable on the fast hi-banks of the 5/8 mile speedway, once again walked off with the main event win, his eighth out of 12 starts this season. Miltons Howie Scannell ended in the runnerup spot this time, followed closely by Kenny Cassel of Buffalo, N.Y., fading Earl Ross of Toronto to second, ahead of Lowry Siemens, Helmet Hess and Billy Schlitt.

In the 15 lap Mini-Stox Main event, Fisherville's Larry Anthony managed to survive four caution periods for smash-ups and spin-outs to pick off his second feature victory of the season. Chris Bunting of Toronto was second, ahead of Lowry Siemens, Helmet Hess and Billy Schlitt.

Mike Wroble was the leader for the first three circuits, then Scannell took over! On lap five, Art Clark, second place to Reimer in the point standings at this time, looped his '71 Challenger on turn number four, dropping to fourteenth. On lap six, Ray Gullison snatched the lead as Reimer moved into second place. On the backstretch on lap 12, Reimer streaked into the lead and was never headed. In the process of his victory, Reimer set a new 25 lap mark in the record book at an average speed of 100.44 MPH, besting the old average of 99.55 MPH, set by Clark on May 28 of this year.

Two serious accidents marred the otherwise event free evening. On the first lap of the Late Model Super Stock consolation event, Ron Smith of London, Ont., became the first driver to clear the outside retaining wall and land outside the race track this year. His car did several roll overs, landing on its wheels, its top completely ripped off. Smith's roll bars and seat-shoulder harness prevented any serious injury. He was taken to the hospital for a checkup and later released.

On the second circuit of the 20 lap CAN-Am TQ midget Feature event, Larry Glaser of Kenmore, N.Y., lost the right front wheel of his car as he came out of turn number four and hit the outside retaining wall on the main straightaway a

hard, glancing smash. North Tonawanda's Tommy (Wild) Rose captured his second consecutive 20 lap feature victory as he blasted into the lead on the fifth lap to win by a comfortable margin over Sean Shanahan of Etobicoke, Ont., and Sal Libatore of Kenmore, N.Y.

Ken Cassel beat Earl Ross and Ray Gullison on the first qualifier for the Late Model Super Stocks and Howie Scannell outran Reimer and Watson in the second.

Anthony and Siemens were victors in the 10 lap Mini-Stox heat events and newcomer Fred Smith of Cayuga copped the consi.

Veteran driver Harry Macy of Buffalo captured the evenings opening 10 lap affair in the TQ midget class and young Stan Kuwabara of Hamilton was tops in the second. Tonawanda's Johnny Fitzgibbon was Smooth in his six lap conquest of the consolation contents.

Fresh Beets With Scallion Butter
8 medium-size fresh beets 1/2 cup chopped scallions
3 tablespoons melted butter 1/4 teaspoon salt
or margarine 1/8 teaspoon pepper

Remove greens from beets, leaving about 1-inch of the stem end intact. Cover and cook in a small amount of boiling salted water until just tender. Melt butter or margarine in a small skillet; add scallions and cook until tender. Slip skins off beets. Slice beets and toss with scallion butter. Season with salt and pepper.
Makes: 4 servings.

REPORT

LARGEST CAUSE HALIFAX (CP)
Inattention was the largest cause of motor vehicle accidents in Nova Scotia last year, figures released by the Registry of Motor Vehicles indicate. Driver inattention was responsible for 20 percent of the 14,190 accidents investigated by police departments around the province. Operating too fast for road conditions was the cause of about 14 percent of the mishaps, which claimed 219 lives and caused property damage of \$8.2 million.

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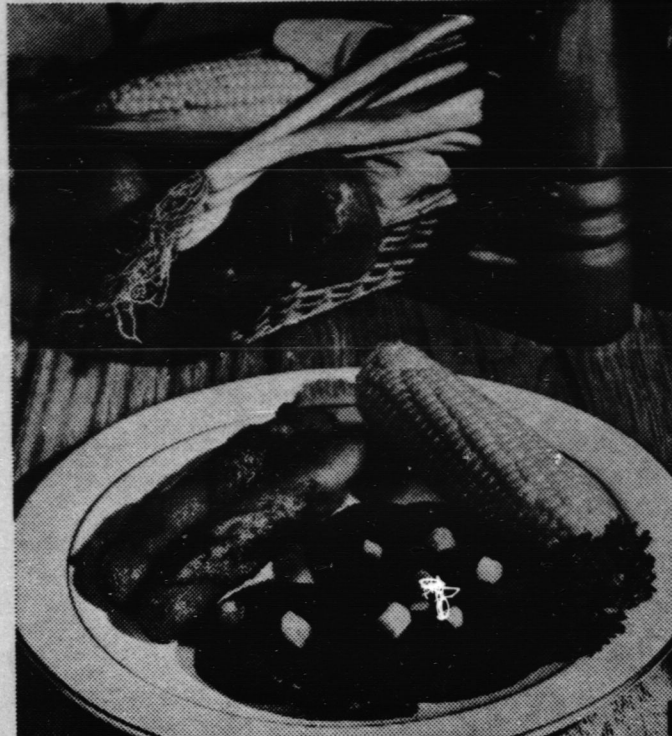
