Teachers On The Job Although Salaries Not Settled

will resume their duties when school opens in September although they have not reached agreement with the board on a new salary schedule.

Spokesmen for both the Haldimand Board of Education and the teachers said that negotiations are continuing and relations between the two are cordial.

Carl Gilmore, chief negotiator for the teachers, said, there are a few "hangups" that have developed. He said that there is no bombshell to burst and the negotiations that started in March will be

continued next week. He said the board and the teachers have agreed to issue joint statements on the matter.

Donald Duxbury, spokesman for the board agreed that the negotiations have been cordial.

Present salary schedules range from \$5,400 annually for a category one teacher to \$11,700 for a category four.

Secondary school teachers, who settled their salaries with the board in the spring, receive \$7,100 for category one to \$15,500 for category four.

Hagersville Hires New Policeman

Hagersville — A new policeman has been hired by village council to bring its police department back to full strength.

David MacGregor, 23, a Stelco employee was chosen from 32 applications.

Mr. MacGregor will take up his new career in two weeks.

He has had similar experience as a security guard and a frontiersman, a voluntary force that acts in a similar role to the Canadian Corps of Commissioners.

He is six-feet, three inches tall and weighs 195 pounds.

An opening was made in the force when Chief Ray Holden resigned to accept a new job as chief of Walkerton. Warren Burger, a first class constable with the village, was elevated to chief. The department will now be at full strength of four.

Mr. MacGregor was born in Scotland and came to Canada in 1959 to the Hamilton area. He completed grade 10 there before joining Stelco.
