Cayuga, Ont. — Cayuga Speedway is pleased to announce the 1971 Imperial Hell Driver Thrill Show will perform on the 5/8 mile track on Sunday, Aug. 22, starting at 8.30 p.m. The consistency successful show has utilized a fleet of Chrysler cars for their many daredevil feats over the years. The organization, in operation since 1959, was conceived by owner Paul Riddell and has played to over two million people since its inception.

The auto thrill show features the breath-taking acts that makes this type daredevil feats in a class of their own. Natch Miller of Atlanta, Georgia bursts through a wall of flame on a motorcycle, Ray Mullin does the ever-present T-bone car crash as all the drivers participate in the precision "over the ramps" auto-cross on the tracks main straightaway. Cars are rolled over, crashed head-on in mid-air as Ko Ko the Clown gets in everyone's way in his Krazy Kar.

To highlight the evening, an attempt will be made to establish a new world's record for driving a car around the 5/8 oval on two wheels. Before the fans can recover their breath, the sky-divers will retake it as they free-fall from a fantastic height and land in the centre of the race plant.

A new and exciting game of polo will then begin, with contestants driving the fat, six-wheeled "swamp-buggies" as they attempt to blast the oversized beach ball over the opponents goal. The contest has proven to be very popular with the younger set because of the current dune-buggy craze across the nation.

Cayuga, Ont. — The third regular stock car racing program for the month of August will be presented this Friday evening, Aug. 20 at Canada's only super-raceway, Cayuga Speedway, located near Nelles Corners, Ont. All three divisions are scheduled to see action on the hi-banks of the 5/8 mile paved oval, including the fantastic late model super stocks, in their inaugural year as the headline event, plus the closely competitive CAN-AM TQ midgets and the often times hilarious and popular mini-stocks Foreign cars.

The drivers chase for the Carling \$5,000 Point Fund has become extremely taut as the season comes to a close. If the leaders of each division should hesitate or stumble for one program, the results could change in that time! Oakville's Ken Reimer leads the L-M Super Stocks class, two time defending champion Bruce Bolitsky of Waterloo, Ont. is the leader in the CAN-AM TQ midget division and Larry Anthony is Fisherville's leading citizen at this time by virtue of his heading the mini-stock category.

The following race program, Friday night, Aug. 27, another three star show is on tap for the fans, with special attention for the open cockpit enthusiast. This event will be an extra lap affair for the CAN-AM

TQ midgets on the 1/5 mile inner paved oval. The scaled down replica's of the torque twisting sprint cars will dice for an increased purse, which should attract highly touted championship caliber drivers from all points of the U.S.A.

Heading the list of local favorites is defending champ Bruce Bolitsky, along with Stan Kuwabara, Harry Macy, Sean Shanahan, Tommy Rose and Al Banyard.

Racing each night gets underway at 8.30 p.m., with warmups and practice slated for 7 p.m. The track is located between no. 3 Highway at Nelles Corners and no. 6 Highway at Hagersville, Ont.

Soil Mapping From Airplanes

Soil mapping over some of Canada's most difficult terrain may be feasible by aerial photography.

A study conducted by the Canada Department of Agriculture has demonstrated that the technique can produce results with up to 80 percent accuracy.

The aerial photography was done over a mountain and valley region on the southwest coast of Vancouver Island near Port Renfrew.

Four types of pictures were taken and interpreted by specialists. Their interpretations were checked against the work of a ground crew to determine the accuracy of the technique. K. W. G. Valentine of the CDA Research Station at Vancouver was in charge of the study.

Increased Returns For Dairy Farmers

Increased producer returns to Ontario dairy farmers, for milk going into certain manufactured dairy products, are announced by the Ontario Milk Marketing Board.

Effective immediately, milk for butter, skim milk powder, condensed and evaporated milk, whole milk powder and casein is raised 25 cents per hundredweight from \$3.99 to \$4.24. Price as quoted is for bulk milk. Can milk is ten cents per hundredweight less.

In making the announcement, George R. McLaughlin, Chairman of the Ontario Milk Marketing Board, pointed out that monies received for the sale of milk by the board are pooled.

"These increases," he said, "will have a bearing on the pool price so that producers whose milk is directed by the board into the manufacturer of products other than those mentioned will also benefit from these changes."

This action by the Board follows the announcement by the Federal Minister of Agriculture, last Thursday, of product price support increases for butter and skim milk powder. The Canadian Dairy Commission, effective immediately, increased its price support for butter by three cents per pound (from 65 cents to 68 cents) and for skim milk powder by two cents per pound (from 24 cents to 26 cents).

Department Activities Featured At CNE Exhibit

Ontario Is For Living — and from Aug. 19 to Sept. 6, visitors to the Canadian National Exhibition will have a chance to glimpse an integral part of Ontario life, the agriculture and food industry.

Approximately 1,600 members of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food serve the Ontario public. An exhibit in the Ontario Government Building will highlight some of their activities. Demonstrations of wine making and chicks hatching are two of a wide range of displays. Home gardeners will be interested in an array of shrubs and plants. Consumers will be able to learn how the Department's farm products inspection services work for them and will also be able to see a film on quality control of milk. Those considering an agricultural career will be interested in a film on educational opportunities at the various agricultural colleges in the province.

There is much more to see, all of it designed to acquaint the visitor with the work being done by the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food.

Mr. McLaughlin also pointed out that the Canadian Dairy Commission also increased its price support for cheddar cheese by three cents per pound (from 51 cents to 54 cents), but no further increase could be given to producers for milk going into the manufacture of this product at this time.

"A substantial increase in returns to Ontario's producers," he said, "for milk directed by the Board for the production of cheddar cheese was established earlier this month. Milk for cheddar cheese was raised \$1.15 per hundredweight from \$3.99 to \$5.14."
