### REPORT

Cayuga detachment recorded its fourteenth fatal collision for 1971, when Armand P. Langlais, age 25, 13 Park St., Welland, Ont., died of injuries on Aug. 21, 1971, on No. 3 Highway, Moulton Township. This brings a total of seventeen persons being killed in Haldimand County to date. This period last year number of fatal collisions were eleven.
