### Editorial Comment

#### Fire Chasing A Hazard

People chasing fire trucks in the community are a hazard to pedestrian safety. This is especially true in case of children.

The younger people, both on foot and bicycles, were seen last week in pursuit of the fire department. These people also slowed the fire department in its vital time at the fire. The fire had been reported at the dump and the brigade had gone to the Jarvis dump only to find the blaze was at the Walpole dump.

Pedestrians and young people on bicycles as well as motor traffic blocked the laneway through which the fire truck had to return to be on its way to Walpole dump.

Several children were shouted at to get out of the way. This all brings up the question of how to control this type of situation.

The Record earlier had suggested to the municipal council that it needs its own policeman. Such a man could be on the job to control traffic in the case of a fire as provincial police would find it difficult to be right when such an emergency arises.

One day if such a step isn't taken it will cost the life of one of the community's citizens.

#### Coon Invasion

To the country dweller who has had racoons raid his chicken house, it must be some sort of consolation to hear that the engaging beasts have invaded one of Canada's biggest cities.

They have been raiding Toronto's inner city by night, knocking over garbage cans, ripping open rubbish bags and tearing up flower beds and lawns in search for food, as well as making homes in chimneys, attics and garages.

And, as everyone knows, city people have no coon pounds to tree them. Instead, they call the exterminators who normally go after rats, mice and insects.

Well, as one exterminator said, the coons are the No. 1 enemy and a humane society inspector said the invasion is getting worse every year.

Just how bad is the invasion is described by one woman who lost at least three families of goldfish from her backyard pond to the marauders. She finally protected her pets by covering the pool with wire mesh, hammered into the ground around the pool.

Another woman, just out of hospital, almost had to turn her when a racoon chewed its way through her railing while she was in the bathtub.

The humane society man says the trouble is the result of the construction boom. Wooded areas and green belts where the coons live are being replaced by office buildings and apartment towers, driving the animals farther into the city.

One exterminator, busy with calls to get rid of a house-holder's racoons, came up with two ideas: sterilize them before turning them loose; or have the government airlift them to the far north.

But what sounds like the most effective idea has come from a veteran garbage man who deals with 30 or more cases of coon incidents a day: a coon hunt.

"If the city fathers would put forth a bounty on coons, us guys would all be armed and we'd be rich in no time."

#### FOREST FIRES ACROSS CANADA IN JULY

The Canadian Forestry Service recorded 2,489 forest fires across Canada during the month of July. This was only 31 more than during the same period last year but considerably higher than the 1,798 - year average of 1,798 for the month of July. Total forest area affected in July was 1,190,000 acres, more than double the 10-year average of 587,000 acres for July.

The total number of forest fires in Canada this year to July 31 was 6,938 over a total area of 2,246,000 acres.

The figures are compiled monthly by the Forest Fire Research Institute of the Canadian Forestry Service from provincial records.

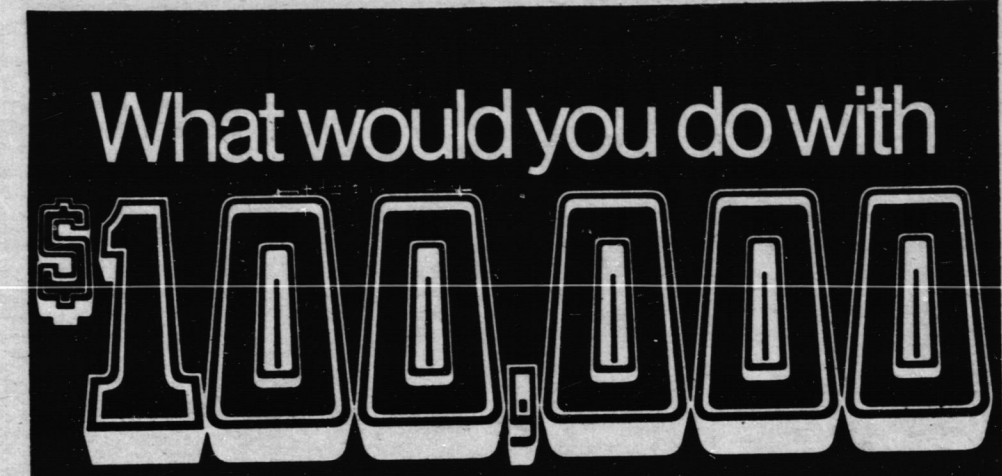
Fort William district. Cross said the frog's general characteristics are similar to those of ordinary frogs.

### REPORT

Cayuga detachment recorded its fourteenth fatal collision for 1971, when Armand P. Langlais, age 25, 13 Park St., Welland, Ont., died of injuries on Aug. 21, 1971, on No. 3 Highway, Moulton Township. This brings a total of seventeen persons being killed in Haldimand County to date. This period last year number of fatal collisions were eleven.

Officers investigated fourteen other motor vehicle collisions which resulted in injuries to 4 persons.

General occurrences investigated were: five thefts, six break and enters, 21 requests for assistance, six other criminal code offences, two assaults, four willful damage offences, three liquor control act investigations resulting in four charges being laid and three impaired driving charges.

In most car collisions, the passenger compartment remains in good shape after the crash except where it is damaged by flying bodies. The Ontario Safety League urges everyone who rides in a car to have their seat belts buckled up, whenever the car is in motion.
