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GARNET BLANKS FISHERVILLE

The opening contest on Nov. 23 saw a badly undermanned Fisherville crew go down to a 5-0 defeat at the hands of the surging Garnet Plowboys.

After a 15 minute delay and the necessity to use a substitute goaltender, plus a few recruits for the evening, the Bushwackers came out aggressively and held the big boys from Garnet off for the opening stanza.

However, after rangy Fred McKeen snapped in a goal at the 13.05 mark, the Plowboys were away and flying.

Bob Awde tallied at 5.30 from Paul Beischlag, then father John Beischlag

responded with a marker at 3.15 from F. McKeen and T. Phibbs. Dave Pankhurst, the fine Garnet defenceman closed out the period with a pretty individual effort to make the score read 4-0.

In the final stanza only the fine effort by the tired Fisherville team, kept the Plowboys down and limited them to one final goal from John Porter assisted by newcomer to the league Dave Sayer.

BRUINS GAIN TOP SPOT

The evening's second game shaped up as the battle for first place in the early standings as both Smoothtown and the Hagersville Hawks were defeated as they took to the ice.

In the opening period, Bill Prince sent the Hawks

in front 1-0 from J. Herkimer and P. De Pasquale, only to have Larry J. Hill notch a pretty answering goal at the 1.12 mark assisted by A. Tripp and E. Smith.

The Hawks gained sole possession of the lead in the second stanza as young "Cheetah" Chrystler and Glen Simon combined for a power-play goal at the 12 mark. Simon stole the puck and fed a nice pass to "Cheetah" who beat Dave Halfpenny, alias "Tonto", in nets for the Bruins.

With the action picking up as the third period began, Bill Squires rapped home the tying goal with J. Herkimer and J. Bradley sitting out penalties for the Hagersville crew. At the 11 mark Larry Hill took passes from Squires and Steve Smith to send Smoothtown ahead 3-2 for the first time.

Moments later Sherwood Porter was banished for the game by referee Pete Myke after a penalty call and some "unnecessary verbosity". Those few uncontrolled seconds will cost Woody the next two games in suspension according to league rules.

Hard playing Jim Herkimer clicked at 7.50 from De Pasquale and Prince on a fine power-play effort to dead-lock the contest 3-3. The winning score came at 3.06 as Steve Smith slammed home a Ken Maracle and Larry Hill combination to give the Smoothtown squad a 4-3 victory and the league lead.

Bill Squires played his usual outstanding game and took over the scoring lead from absent Larry Simon. Bill has four goals and four assists, while Larry stayed at six goals.

FLYERS NIP JARVIS

In the late game, a robust crew of Smoothtown boys came to bat against the winless Merchants. Jarvis and battle they called all told with 15 penalties. Nineteen penalties called to the hard hitting Referees Peter Myke and Paul Kett had a whistle blowing in the contest.

He said that officials have been right 95 per cent of their calls. He stressed the idea that football is a game to an end. Since very few high school players make it to the C.F.L., the proper attitudes gained from the game can be used in other endeavours.
