## Teatime Topics

A couple of cans of salmon in the cupboard can be handy if supplies run out or people drop in.

The Canned Salmon Association of British Columbia has some suggestions on how to use it in out of the ordinary ways.

A salmon pie calls for: 1 can (7% ounce) salmon, 1 can cream of celery soup, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 slightly beaten egg, 1/8 teaspoon marjoram, one 9-inch pie shell (unbaked), 1 tablespoon sesame seeds (optional), 8 strips pimento, 16 slices pitted black olives.

Flake salmon. Blend soup, green pepper, bread crumbs, egg and marjoram. Before making up pie shell, mix sesame seeds with the flour and then follow your usual recipe. Place flaked salmon on top of crust. Pour soup mixture over. Place pimento strips in criss-cross patterns on top of pie. Place olive slices between the crosses. Bake at 425 for 25 to 30 minutes, until crust is slightly browned. Serves 6.

TRY SOUP  
A salmon chowder calls for: 1 can (7% ounces) salmon, 1 can tomato soup, 1 cup milk, including reserved salmon liquid, 3/4 cup cream-style corn, 3/4 teaspoon ground ginger. Drain salmon and flake, crushing bones and reserving the liquid to measure with the milk. Blend soup and

milk unto smooth. Add cream-style corn, curry and ginger. Add flaked salmon. Heat, but do not let boil. Makes 4 servings.

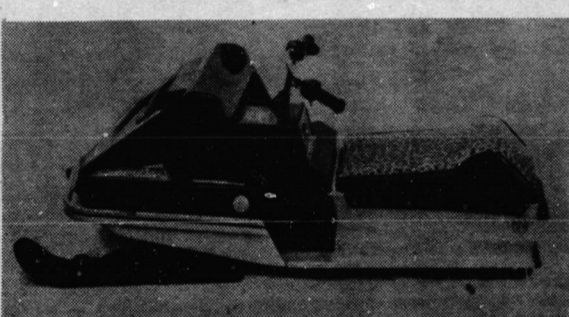
A salmon casserole calls for: 2 cans (7% ounce) salmon, 3 cups seasoned mashed potatoes, 1 can cheddar cheese soup, 1/2 cup half and half milk, 1 teaspoon curry powder, salt and pepper to taste, parsley. Flake salmon. Line a buttered 2-quart casserole with the mashed potatoes. Spread salmon on top. Heat soup, half and half and seasoning. Pour over salmon. Sprinkle with parsley. Bake at 375 for about 20 minutes. Serves 6.

QUICK ROLL-UPS  
An appetizer of salmon calls for: 1 can (7% ounce) salmon, seasoned salt to taste, 1/3 can of mushroom soup, 1 package 8 (ounce) refrigerated crescent rolls, 1 egg slightly beaten, sesame seeds. Add seasoned salt and soup to salmon and mix well. Separate crescent roll

enough into the four rectangles, pinching the seam together in each rectangle. Spread each rectangle with 1/4 of the salmon mixture. Roll each rectangle up, starting at the long side. Cut each roll in 1/2-inch pieces. Brush the tops with beaten egg and dip in sesame seeds. Bake on a lightly greased baking sheet at 375 degrees for about 15 minutes. Serve hot as an appetizer.

TEST HELMETS
