## Walpole Councillors To Tour Area Dump Sites

Walpole Township will be making area dumps on Dec. 16. The installations of the dumps will be made in the morning.

At its meeting last Friday, councillors viewed the Walpole dump site during the noon hour.

The dump site has been causing concern among the councillors and a committee has been set up to try and find answers to the problems at the dump. The dump is a trench-and-fill type with no burning of refuse allowed.

However, this is difficult to police and fires are set to burn the garbage. Planes from the Welland office of the air and water pollution control branch patrol the area and report any burning. Burning can be done, but a permit must be obtained each time any burning is to be undertaken.

The high heat of the incinerator renders all household garbage to ash. Tins and metallic garbage are also broken down by the high heat. This leaves a completely germ free residue that can then be put into land fill use.

Council will also be reviewing its bylaws regarding the use of the dump. Council's two representatives on the region's economic council were instructed to pass on recommendations from the township that in turn could be passed on to the Haldimand-Norfolk Study. Coun. Harold Nie said the economic council had asked for recommendations to send to the provincial study.

## Dunnville Fire Razes Buildings; 13 Homeless

DUNNVILLE - The major fire in as many years struck Dunnville leaving in its wake an estimated \$1 million dollars. A spectacular early fire reduced three town buildings to rubble and wiped out six homes. Thirteen persons were left homeless.

Chief Gerald Schott has estimated the damage to the buildings at \$1 million. The fire broke out at the Canadian Tire store where the fire is believed to have started; Sensabaugh's barber shop, Schott's photo studio, Art beauty salon and the Knew aquarium and glass shop, all in the building owned by Mrs. George Featherstone of Main St., and Robins meat market, which occupied a building on Queen St. next to Canadian Tire.

Catherine Abbey and her child. All were taken in by relatives. The alarm was turned in by James Roloson, of Dunnville at 2.20 a.m. Chief McCarthy said the Canadian Tire store was engulfed in flames when firefighters arrived and the fire quickly spread to the other buildings.

The 13 persons living in apartments above the stores were all led to safety. Two women were assisted down ladders by fire fighters.

Howard Brown, operator of the Canadian Tire Store was unable to estimate his losses, but said the store had been stocked for the Christmas season.

The 29-member Dunnville volunteer brigade was assisted by 31 members of the Dunn Township brigade and the Moulton-Sherbrook No. 2 fire company.

Heavy smoke was still pouring from the three buildings Sunday morning and firemen remained at the scene until mid-afternoon.

## Fisherville Lions Open \$30,000 Medical Centre

FISHERVILLE (Staff) - A \$30,000 medical centre was officially unveiled Sunday, marking the completion of one of the largest projects undertaken by the Fisherville District Lions Club.

More than 100 persons turned out to fill the auditorium at the public school next door to the new medical centre for the ceremonies conducted by program chairman L. Keith Thomson, president of the Fisherville District Lions.

A committee was then formed under the chairmanship of James Lynch. It was the committee's responsibility to locate suitable property and proceed with the construction of a medical centre.

### Liquor Allowed With Meals

ONEIDA TOWNSHIP - Liquor will now be allowed to be served with meals, but no liquor lounges will be permitted following a vote last week.

It was early in 1968 that a committee was formed to study the feasibility of bringing a doctor into the Fisherville-Selkirk area.

It was the desire of the committee to locate property midway between the villages of Selkirk and Fisherville. However, difficulty was encountered in this respect and consequently the present site was purchased from the Kiefer family.

The meal question was carried past the required 60 per cent mark by nine votes. The second question, which would have allowed liquor lounges, was defeated by a two-vote margin.

The original committee was comprised of Lions members George Schwyer, Alec Stickle and William Clarke.

The committee visited various communities which had undertaken similar projects and obtained their views. Stanley Lint of Cayuga was hired to construct the existing building.

Forty-seven per cent of the township's 995 eligible voters turned out.

Five businessmen who opened a nine-hole, pay-as-you-go golf course at Willow Grove prompted the vote. They are paying the expected \$500 cost of the plebiscite.

Dr. Sri Villavarayan arrived from England in May to set up practice in Fisherville in temporary facilities in the former Royal Bank building. He moved into the new facilities on Oct. 15.

Opposition to the vote came mainly from a United Church minister, Rev. Arthur Magee.

Dr. W. J. Copeman, of the health department, conducted an area survey to establish if the need was there. Immediately upon his findings, he contacted the club and stated it was his opinion that, should facilities be made available, there would be little difficulty in obtaining a doctor.

Some \$15,000 of the total for the building has been raised by the Lions through projects such as a walkathon, a booth at the International Plowing Match and parking cars at the match, fish fries and other projects. The other half of the total is in the form of a bank loan. The Lions are
