administrators were busy setting up various agencies and study committees to deal with sports problems. One report told how the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union was setting up a committee to study the impact of non-Canadian athletes - especially U.S. imports - on Canadian college sports.

Another report carried the announcement by Health Minister John Munro that the federal government was putting \$350,000 into a new agency called Sport Participation Canada whose prime objective is to lure lazy Canadians away from their TV sets and into sport participation.

On the same day, a feature report from New York pointed out that United States colleges have become a major talent pool for National Hockey League recruiters.

While the CIAU was only setting up a study committee and was not passing judgment on U.S. students studying and participating in athletics in Canada, there was some indication the study was

being undertaken in a negative frame of mind. Ponders Restrictions

In other words, the CIAU is apparently out to find out whether there is reason to restrict foreign students participating in Canadian college athletics. Would they bother to spend the effort on a study to find whether such participation should be encouraged?

Apparently, the CIAU, or at least some of its Canadian college members, are worried that U.S. students, with superior experience in such sports as basketball, would give the Canadian team for which they play an unfair advantage.

Already in the new Great Plains Athletic Conference made up of Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Western Ontario schools, no import freshman are allowed to play intercollegiate sports. The position of the Great Plains conference is puzzling in view of such reports as that from New York about the high calibre of hockey players produced by U.S. colleges.

It is well known that most of those U.S. college

players are Canadians. And despite the fact the U.S. college have taken some steps to restrict top Canadian Junior A players from moving on to U.S. schools, the southward traffic continues apace.

ECONOMICS WILL DECIDE

It is a well-known fact that high cost of transportation is having a tendency to draw more and more industry to the larger centres where they are closer to the bulk of their market. If this tendency continues, it will doom the smaller towns within easy access of the city to be gobbled up, the ones within easy driving radius to become commuter and retirement areas, and the ones beyond the easy driving radius to become ghost towns. It will be the economic factor rather than town or city planning that will determine this in the long run. If less expensive means of moving persons and materials are found that will make it economically feasible industry and people will gladly forsake the city pollution for the clean air and water of smaller towns, otherwise the cities will grow bigger and dirtier and the small towns will eventually disappear. —Stanstead (Que.)
