The tourist industry, if we are willing to put up the capital for development and promotion, and research type of industry that requires the use of brains and knowledge that do not require expensive transportation. A growing and thriving granite industry we already have. Our main effort now should be directed toward developing and selling the tourist industry, and selling the fact that we have an excellent climate for research-type industry. If we fail to sell, chances are we will continue to decline as we have in the past 50 years. - Stanstead (Que.) Journal

Coincidentally, it was learned recently that the CNE has proposed edulating its stadium to accommodate baseball as well as football, with the possible addition of 27,000 seats to bring capacity to more than 60,000.

Only a Proposal - Cost of the proposed rebuilding has been estimated at \$12 to \$16 million.

The CNE stadium now used by Toronto Argonauts of the Eastern Football

Garrick, however, stressed that the rebuilding is only a proposal made to Metropolitan Toronto's stadium committee. As far as he knows, the CNE plan and one for domed stadium in North York were the

only proposals submitted. The present CNE plans are a revision of blueprints first drawn up in 1965 by A.D. Margison and Associates, a Toronto firm of consulting engineers.

Meanwhile, CNE officials have talked with two manufacturers of artificial turf to determine the cost of replacing the existing playing surface of the

Poor field conditions at the stadium for last November's Grey Cup game drew widespread criticism, but Garrick said artificial turf won't go down until CNE officials know which proposal - theirs or North York's - will be adopted by

"We won't make a move until the stadium committee makes a decision," he said. Garrick did not know when
