On The Farm Front

The five new committee men elected to the Haldimand Milk Committee are Ralph Cherry, RR 5, Hagersville; Russell Smith, RR 1, Caledonia; Blake Stadder, RR 1, Selkirk; Peter Oosterhoff, RR 9, Dunnville; and Gordon Miller, RR 1, Jarvis. The new committee men will serve on the Haldimand Milk Committee for the term 1971 - 1973.

Mr. Harold Clapp, dairy cattle specialist, will be discussing the use of R.O.P. records to the best advantage in the feeding and culling programs in herds on test.
Publication 296, the 1971 Field Crop Recommendations is now available at the Agricultural Office, Cayuga.
The Basic Herd is determined as the number of animals or their replacements, expressed in terms of mature animals, which have been acquired without reducing income which is subject to tax.
To increase an existing Basic Herd an application to "Increase Basic Herd" must be filed before April 30, 1971, for the year 1970.


Natural increase animals which matured in 1970 and purchased animals which matured in 1970 may also be included provided that the fair market value of the animals is added to the 1970 income.
The use of R.O.P. records will be the discussion topic at a meeting on Thursday, Feb. 4, at the Rural Youth Centre, Kohler. The program commences at 10 a.m. and finishes about 3 p.m.
