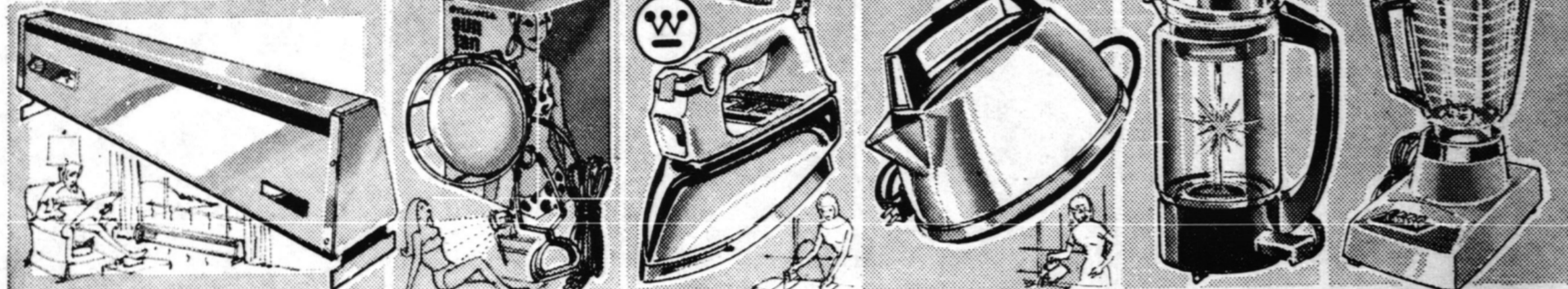

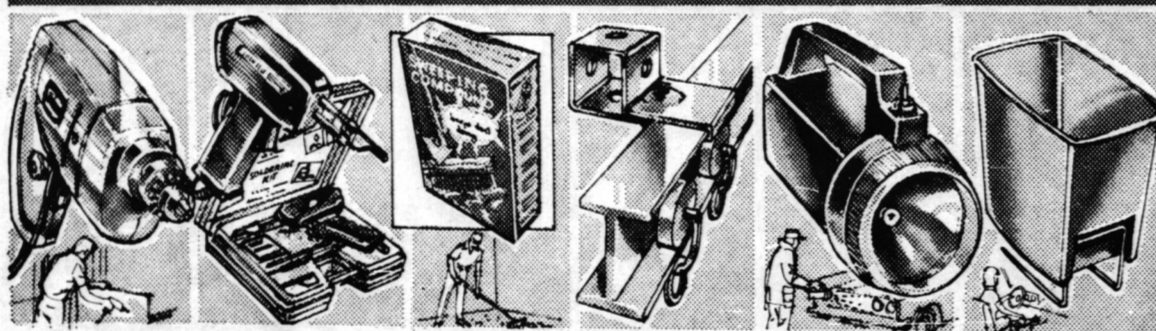

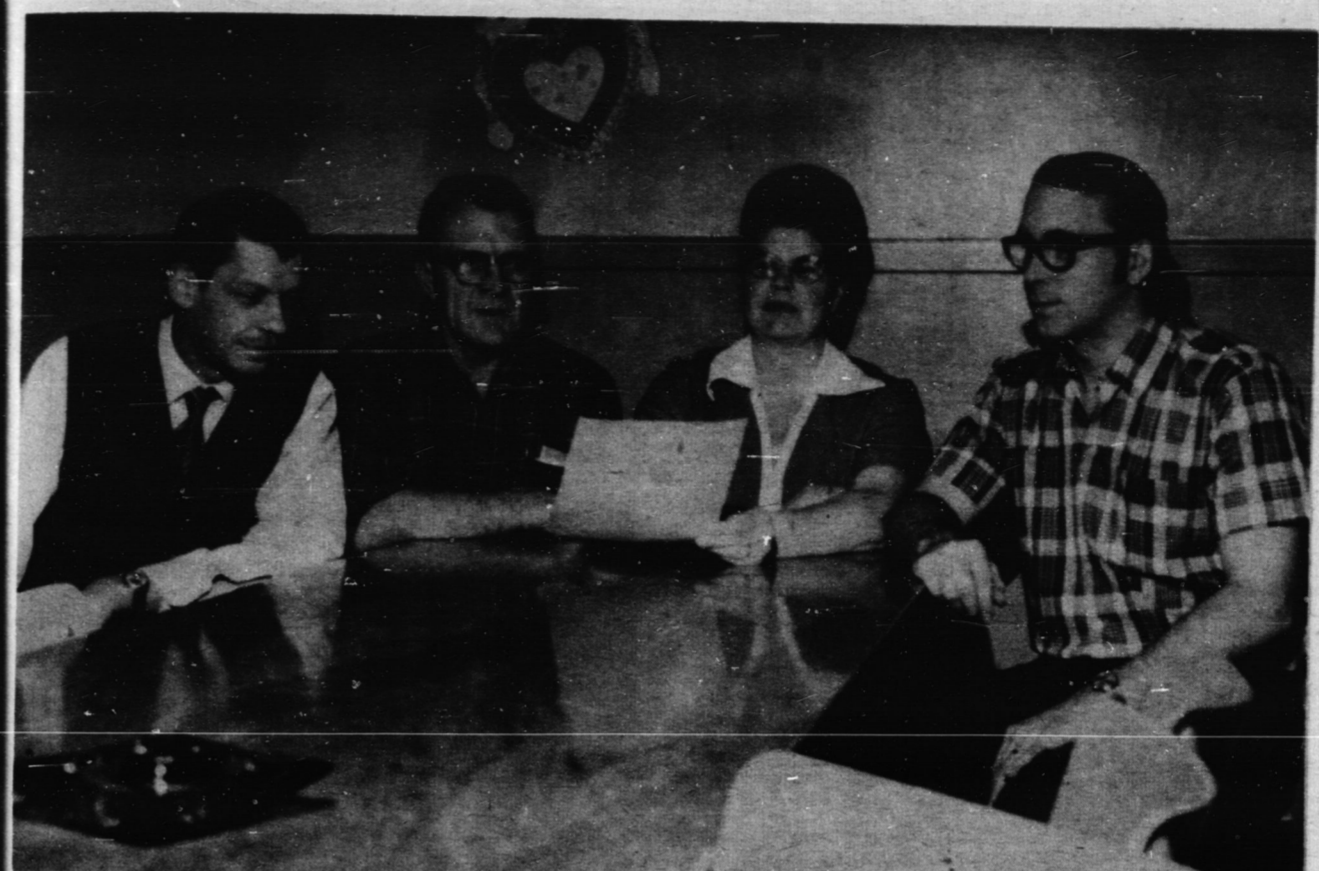

## Leadership Race In Countdown

TORONTO - The countdown to leadership is well underway here at Apple Leaf Gardens as Ontario Conservatives head yard balloting tomorrow to select their leader and temporarily, east, the province's new premier.

Extensive campaigning by various candidates porters is taking place throughout the sports centre and in the lobbies of the rooms of the Royal York and Westbury hotels. At press time it appears just over 1,000 of the 48 delegates are committed to a particular candidate, while the rest are waiting for the final speeches before casting their votes.

A cross-section opinion poll of delegates from throughout the province shows Education Minister William Davis with a substantial lead over the other five candidates. However, unless there is a minute Davis-surge, he will not win the first ballot.

Haldimand-Norfolk MPP James Allen is at the convention and is a confirmed Davis supporter. Queried recently about his own plans concerning the newly predicted and upcoming provincial election, Mr. Allen said he would wait until a new leader is determined before deciding to seek re-election.

Behind Mr. Davis, but coming on strong, are Provincial Secretary Robert Welch and Mines Minister Allan Lawrence. Back of this trio looms Financial and Commercial Affairs Minister A. B. R. (Bert) Lawrence, who could be the dark horse of the convention, and Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough.

Robert Pharand, a 26-year-old Ottawa resident, is also a contender. See Page 10, Col. 3

## To Air The Use Of Snowmobiles In Village

JARVIS - Village council has scheduled a public meeting here next Thursday to cope with snowmobile problems within the municipality's limits.

Reeve W. E. Austin told The Record council members have had several complaints about the use of snowmobiles within the Village.

He said he thought that it was just a few individuals who were not using common sense in the use of snowmobiles that were causing the complaints.

"Some are travelling over lawns and other private property without the owner's consent," he said.

The meeting will be held in the basement of the Municipal Building at 8 p.m. A member of the Ontario Provincial Police will attend the meeting. Reeve Austin said.

HAGERSVILLE - Council will consider amending its subdivision agreement proposal to enable a local contractor to proceed with a new 52-lot subdivision.

A delegation of two, John McKellar and Ron Clark of the Haldimand Building Products Ltd., convinced the majority of council that its proposed agreement was too stringent.

## Canadians Need Education On Role Of Agriculture

KOHLER - Education of the Canadian public about Canada's biggest industry - agriculture - is a job that farmer's must do to protect it.

This was the message from Frank Wall, vice-president of The Ontario Federation of Agriculture, speaking to some 350 people attending the county federation's annual banquet last Thursday.

"I say something is wrong when farmers have to produce for less and less although costs continue to rise."

He cited the recent price cutting of the big chain stores as another blow to farmers.

He contended the consumer isn't any better off because of the price cutting of the big chains but they will repay every dollar they have saved in the long run.

"It is time for us to take steps and specify goals so we can look forward to the future of a stabilized agriculture industry."

"The public doesn't seem to realize the importance of agriculture to the economy indeed even the nation."

He said there are 400,000 farms in Canada now and by 1990 it is predicted this will go down to 300,000 farms.

"We are not getting our fair share of the Gross Domestic Product."

Mr. McKellar told council that the clauses to make street lighting a direct cost to the subdividers as well as a capital cost of \$400 for each lot would make the sale price of the lots prohibitive to a lot of people.

He suggested these two items be deleted from the agreement as well as some other small items.

He said the firm had checked agreements made by Waterford and Simcoe for subdivisions and found that these items were not part of their agreements.

Deputy-reeve Ross Sote told council that many enquiries had been made about subdividing in the Village since the subdividers bylaw had been passed in 1968 but there had been no takers.

"I think this is probably because ours is too tough."

He suggested it was time the municipality got something going.

However, the council was split in the vote on a resolution to accept proposed amendments to the subdividers agreement. Reeve Jack Kincaid had to break the tie when Councillor Bob Gedye and Norman Crawford voted against the resolution.

Although there is some speculation as to what actually was intended by the resolution.

The exact wording and spelling was this: "We except (probably meaning accept) amendments proposed by Haldimand Building to the subdivider agreement of the village for the new subdivision, and shall be written into a new agreement with said company."

The company had not previously signed any agreement and the debate was on the village's suggested agreement.

The question has been raised how council can accept amendments to a
