## Enrolment In Ontario Schools Exceeds 2 Million

Enrolment in Ontario elementary and secondary schools has exceeded the two million mark for the first time.

Statistics released by the Ontario Department of Education show that more than one in every four Ontario residents is attending either elementary or secondary school. Altogether there are 2,021,909 students in the kindergarten to Grade 13 population, an increase of 35,113 over 1969.

Boys continue to outnumber girls 1,047,387 to 974,522. The statistics also show that for the third consecutive year the number of schools in operation has decreased. In 1968 there were 5,055 schools. In 1969 the total had dropped to 4,923 and in September 1970, the number stood at 4,816. In 1970, the number of teachers increased by 3,043 to 92,972.

## Open House In Cheapside Brethren In Christ Church

A meeting of "Friendly Good Will" was held in Cheapside Brethren in Christ Church on Thursday evening Feb. 4., the occasion being the showing of pictures of Northern India by the Rev. Harvey Sider a missionary on furlough for three months. Mr. Sider who is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. E. M. Sider has been busy since arriving home in going from place to place on behalf of the work of the church so that friends in his native village have hardly been able to shake his hand. He will be returning to India before the end of February, so that Thursday evening was the only time available to speak in his home church.

The weather was most unfavorable and the roads very treacherous but in spite of these drawbacks there was a good turnout and wonderful fellowship experienced.

Quoting from Isaiah he showed by picture the idols of clay fashioned by hand for worship - noting that after a period of time these idols were thrown into the river. He explained the five year plan whereby a family would have the use of five or at most ten acres of land. The use of fertilizer and agricultural teaching made it possible to raise three crops per year on these plots - rice, wheat and corn as well as vegetables so that we need not send provisions to India to keep the people from starving as in former days. Indian people may still starve but the problem is the transportation of food to most needed locations. The pictures showed the work which Mrs. Sider was doing in teaching domestic skills. Much as the 4-H Clubs are doing in America, she had previously taught Bible lessons but the ruling has been made that these lessons must now be taught by natives who had become Christians.

The political setup now made it hard for missionaries to return home with any assurance of being allowed to return. Mr. Sider, as a member of a Commonwealth country, was assured of being allowed to return. There is no duplication in churches as each denomination has its own area. With Communism being on the increase all churches are training native Christians to take over when it becomes necessary. Their faith must be made strong. He noted that Mrs. Ghandi who was first elected by the Congress party had since the last election had to form a coalition with the Communists for support of her minority government. He was not too sure that there might be stronger Communist infiltration before the next regime.

He showed pictures of the hospital where his cousin laboured and of his own home and surroundings.

The Rev. John Nigh was in charge of the meeting. Rev. G. Taylor-Munro of Jarvis closed the meeting with prayer. Everyone enjoyed meeting Harvey and his wife at the close of the meeting.
