University student, whose only platform plank is the creation of a French unilingual university, is not given a chance and should be knocked out on the first ballot.

There is a strong feeling the Conservative Party of Ontario would be affected seat-wise in rural sections of the province at the next election if Davis or McKeough win the convention.

Some 42 of the party's 68 seats in the Ontario Legislature are rural or have a substantial rural vote.

Many farmers blame Davis for rising education costs and the corresponding increase in taxes on farm properties.

McKeough's trouble, as far as rural delegates are concerned, revolve around his involvement with reassessment and regional government.

Out of all the guesswork, polls, opinions, committed delegates and convention excitement only one thing is certain - Ontario PC's will have a new leader tomorrow evening replacing the retiring Premier John Robarts.

But don't be too surprised if Robarts is drafted by the Conservatives for the next federal election!

INCREASED PRICE TORONTO (CP) - Metropolitan Toronto consumers face higher milk prices. A quart of milk is up as much as four cents from 31 cents. The new price followed an increase of 20 cents a hundredweight (about a half a cent a quart) by the Ontario Milk Marketing Board.
