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Building Replaces Old Structure

CAYUGA - A new post office which opened here today replaces one that has been in use since 1888.

The new brick-veneer building has an interior of bright yellow and blue. It has a spacious interior and air conditioning well as extra room in the rear.

The new office has 400 square feet of space compared to 200 in the old one.

Postmaster Allan Stitt said the Record's moving office has gone smoothly and the new office will be serving very well in a time when all the "presses" are ironed out.

Construction cost of the building was \$42,900. It has 1,876 square feet of space, which 1,876 will be used by employees.

Stitt said there are no definite plans for the old building but it will probably be turned over to the Crown. Assets Disposal Corporation as surplus and sold for tender.

Stitt said quite a number of box holders have changed their keys for the old boxes in the old building for ones that will fit the new ones.

The post office was a controversial matter in its final stages of construction when the village council proposed the proposed use of channel plywood to close the exterior instead of stone.

The post office serves 20 households including rural routes.

Contractor for the new building was Ally Construction Company of Toronto. An official opening of the building will probably be scheduled for a later date.

Salary Arbitration For Police

SIMCOE - Police here will have their salary dispute go to arbitration after salary negotiations broke down with council.

The town's police committee recommended to allow the dispute to go to arbitration, which was endorsed by council Monday.

The committee reported to council that after two meetings with police

representatives last month it was impossible to reach an agreement on a new contract.

The committee said the demands made by the police association could not be justified and a counter offer made that would be in line with wages accepted by other town employees had been rejected by police representatives.

Salaries paid in 1970 for the 15-member force were:

Staff sergeant, \$9,400; sergeant, \$8,900; first class officer \$8,400; second class, \$8,100; third class, \$7,900 and probationary \$7,200.

Meanwhile, contract negotiations for the four-man Hagersville police department have not started. The contract for the department expired Dec. 31.
