

Commercial League Report

The Hagersville Commercial League regular season was concluded last Tuesday evening with Garnet finishing on top followed by the Hawks, Springvale in third place, and the final play-off position won by the Smoothtown Bruins in an exciting upset win over Garnet. The scoring championship was also decided in dramatic fashion as Pat Lorimer's three-goal "hat-trick" vaulted him past Barry Miller of the Ploughboys, and into number one position.

In the opening game, the Flyer's warmed up for play-off action against the Garnet Ploughboys by nipping the Hawks 5-3. Gord Fehrman and Wayne Clause led the Springvale club with two goals apiece and George Jackson supplied a pretty unassisted goal on a break-away, beating Henry Davis cleanly. Denny Wilson played excellent hockey for the sliding Hawks who have dropped their final two games and seem to lack their early season sparkle. With Smoothtown's rejuvenated hockey-club playing outstanding hockey going into the play-offs, this reporter predicts an all-out effort will be needed by any team that opposes the Bruins.

Fourth spot, the final play-off berth was won by Smoothtown by virtue of a sensational 2-1 victory over league winner Garnet. Both teams fought through two scoreless periods of tight exciting hockey before young Paul Beischlag flicked in a Barry Miller pass, father John also assisted on Paul's goal. At 10:55 of the final stanza Cy Johnson of the Bruins knotted the contest by slamming in a Bill Bomberly rebound; Alan White also assisting. The final goal came

unexpectedly as Bill Bomberly fired a long slow floater towards the Garnet net from beyond the red-line. Al Powless seemed to misjudge the puck for a split second and it caromed off his glove hand and into the net. With 33 seconds remaining, the Ploughboys used six attackers and gave Dave Halpenny fits until the buzzer sounded, but they couldn't beat an inspired hockey team this evening. Only three penalties were called all game and only one was given to the Bruins, a club record. I know that Barry Miller of the Ploughboys was quite disappointed in losing the scoring title by a technicality. Barry ended the season with 20 goals and 16 assists. Pat Lorimer with his three goals earlier pushed his season total to 21 goals and 15 assists. Both young men are fine, talented hockey players and have provided many thrills this year for the fans who came out regularly.

The final game of the evening pitted the Jarvis Merchants against the youthful Bushwackers from Fisherville. Though officially closed out of fourth place, both teams played a tough end to end game with Jarvis finally downing the spirited kids, 5-2. Dennis Craddock led the Merchants into fifth place with a goal and two assists — "Crash" finished the season with 31 points and in third place on the scoring list. Other Jarvis goal-getters included Ellard Cowan, Stan Lofthouse and Wayne Nicol. Fisherville got their two tallies from reliable Blair Otterman and Glen Morden. All in all both clubs ended their season's play knowing they had tried their best, and only missed out by a few points.

As mentioned previously the Play-off's begin on Tues. Feb. 16 at 8 p.m. with Garnet opposing Springvale and Hagersville up against Smoothtown. The semi-finals will be a two out of three series, winners to meet in the best three out of five, for the Commercial League Championship. Best of luck to the teams involved, and continue to play as well as you can, remember: "winner's never quit, and quitter's never win."

QUOTE: People do not want to believe what alcohol does to them: UNQUOTE.

These are the words of Mrs. Rita Charlibois, Analyst at the Forensic Science Laboratory in Toronto, whose findings indicate that all but one of the fatal snowmobile accident victims which she checked, had been impaired by alcohol.

Mrs. Charlibois states, "The use of alcohol impairs the field of vision and depth of perception, slows down the reflexes and adversely affects the sense of balance. All of these faculties must be working normally for the

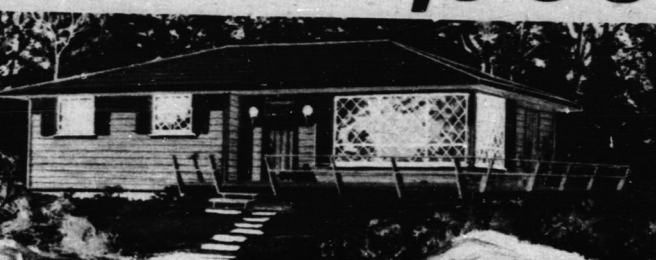
HSS Teachers Attend Meeting


