

## On The Farm Front

Several meetings were re-scheduled because of the weather this past week. Haldimand County Wheat Producers now meet at Kohler on the evening of Monday, Feb. 22.

The Hog Producers' Annual Meeting is now to be held on Thursday evening, Feb. 18. Speakers and program for these meetings will be as previously announced.

Directors of the Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association also had to change their meeting date.

Haldimand's 1970 hog marketings amounted to 47,120, an increase of 14.2 percent over the previous year. Sixty three point seven percent of the 1970 marketings indexed 100 or more. This is better than the Ontario average 62.6 percent and the Canada average of 61.3 percent. It is also an improvement over the 61.8 percent Haldimand record for 1969.

The annual Holstein Club barn meeting will be held on Sat. Feb. 20, at the farm of Fred Topp just east and

north of Canfield. Activity gets underway at 1 p.m. with judging and a weight guessing contest. Other activity planned includes a bus trip to Simcoe County on March 26.

Many Haldimand residents will be taking part in this year's convention of the Ontario Plowmen's Association on Feb. 22 and 23 in Toronto. The local committee for the 1971 International Plowing Match will be out in force for their final presentation to the Ontario Plowmen's Association before this year's International.

John Vandenberg of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food, Vineland, has spent considerable time this past year studying Roadside Marketing and "Pick-Your-Own" marketing of Ontario's fruit and vegetable crops. Boxer Jimmy Ellis is making some predictions about the upcoming Ali-Frazier fight.

He also has great financial expectations for himself during 1971.

The two facts tie in this way:

Ellis foresees Muhammed Ali the victor on the much-publicized fight.

And after that . . . Ellis predicts he will come to the fore as the man who knows Ali's weaknesses.

"After Muhammed Ali beats Frazier next month," he said, "I'll be the one. George Foreman is too young and there's nobody else around who makes sense as an opponent. What's more, I think I know enough about the champ to beat him again."

Ellis and Ali, who was then known as Cassius Clay, met twice as amateurs and broke even. They have never met professionally, though nobody has spent more time in the ring with Ali than Ellis, who was his constant sparring partner until the world champion was stripped of his title and banished from the ring.

Ellis was interviewed in Toronto where he was a

guest of honor at the 20th annual Sports Celebrity dinner.

He also had this to say about the Ali-Frazier fight: "I've seen the champ training in Miami and he looks just great. He's much fitter now than before either of his previous fights and those 15 rounds with Bonavena were just what he needed."

Oscar Bonavena was dispatched in the 15th round as you will recall.

"Sure he fought a bad fight, but this Bonavena is one of the most awkward guys in the world to take on. Against Frazier you will

see an entirely different strategy."

One thing seemed certain about Ellis' Toronto interview.

He now seems to display the same kind of almost blind confidence that characterizes Muhammed himself.

Perhaps it's a trade mark instilled by their manager and trainer Angelo Dundee. Which raises another question.

Who would manage Ellis if that Ellis-Ali fight came about?

Dundee couldn't manage and train both contestants

in a world heavyweight championship fight.

Dundee could naturally stay with Ali, recognizing his first allegiance.

So as well as wanting a chance at Muhammed, Ellis may be wanting a manager-trainer.

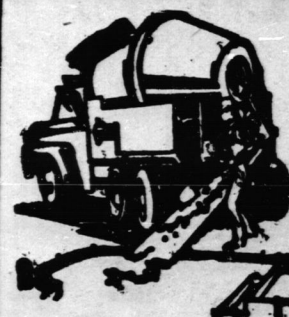

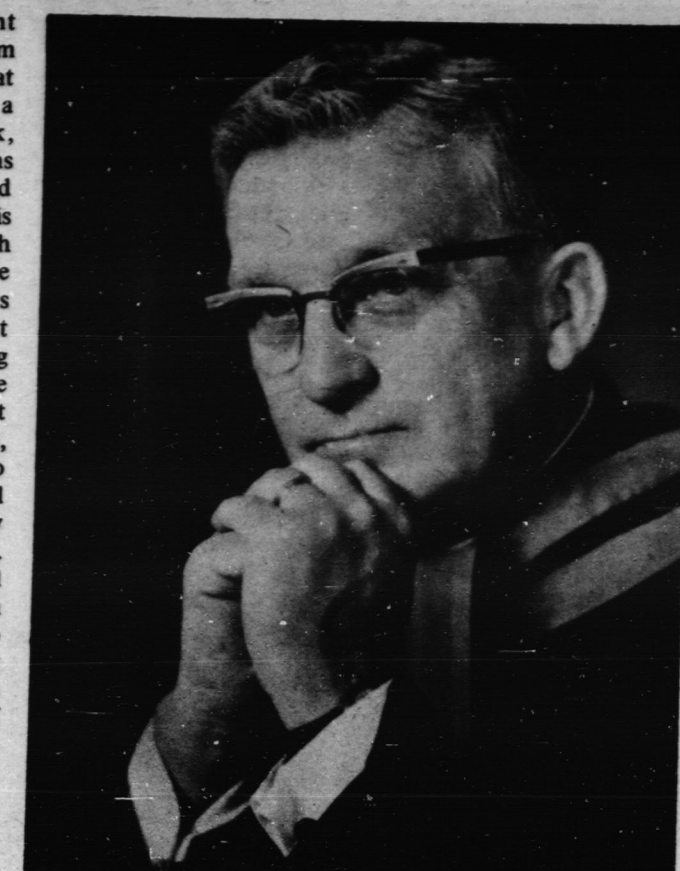
