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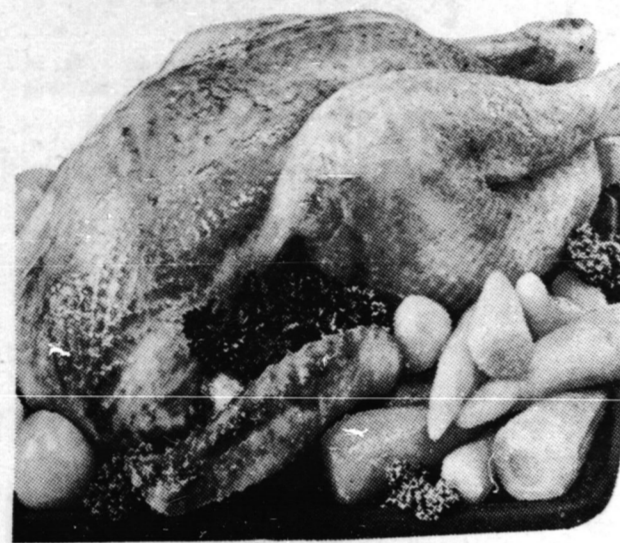

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Rabies Outbreak In Haldimand

Health officials are alarmed at a sudden rise in positive cases of rabies in the county.

Dr. C. L. Cook, veterinarian in charge of Hamilton and district health and animal branch of the Canada Department of Agriculture, told The Record the cases had jumped from one case in all of 1970 to 14 cases from Jan. 1 to Feb. 22.

He said most of the cases occurred along the Grand River between Caledonia and Cayuga with the exception of two cases in cattle near Selkirk.

He said that many more cases may develop but it depends on the amount of wildlife such as skunks and fox in the area.

"If there is only a small number of these animals in the area it is possible the outbreak will peter out."

He said there isn't much you can do to control wildlife.

He cautioned the public to stay clear of obviously sick animals.

He said: "My worry is that when they let the cattle out in the spring that there may be a lot more cases unless of course the wildlife population is small in the area."

May Install Fire Radio Network

HAGERSVILLE - This Village and other area fire departments may be linked into a radio communication network.

Fire Chief Bill McLarty outlined a network plan to council at its regular meeting Monday.

He said the radio equipment necessary would cost each of four municipalities about \$185 a year. These would be Jarvis, Walpole, Onieda and Hagersville.

He said he would seek co-operation from the

Hagersville police and hospital radio network so the proposed system could be in operation 24 hours a day.

Chief McLarty explained this would be done by having extra crystals for each set so the new system could be transferred to the hospital frequency during the hours it would be covering fire emergency.

He told council he would present the plan to the other municipalities before asking for a final decision from Hagersville.

In other business council debated whether it should drop an option on an Almas St. property, which is proposed for a new fire hall site.

Chief McLarty suggested council should consider a site right next to the municipal building, which at See Page 5 Col., 1

Dead is Arthur James Boddington, 50, of RR 1, Selkirk. In Hamilton General Hospital in fair See Page 5 Col., 2

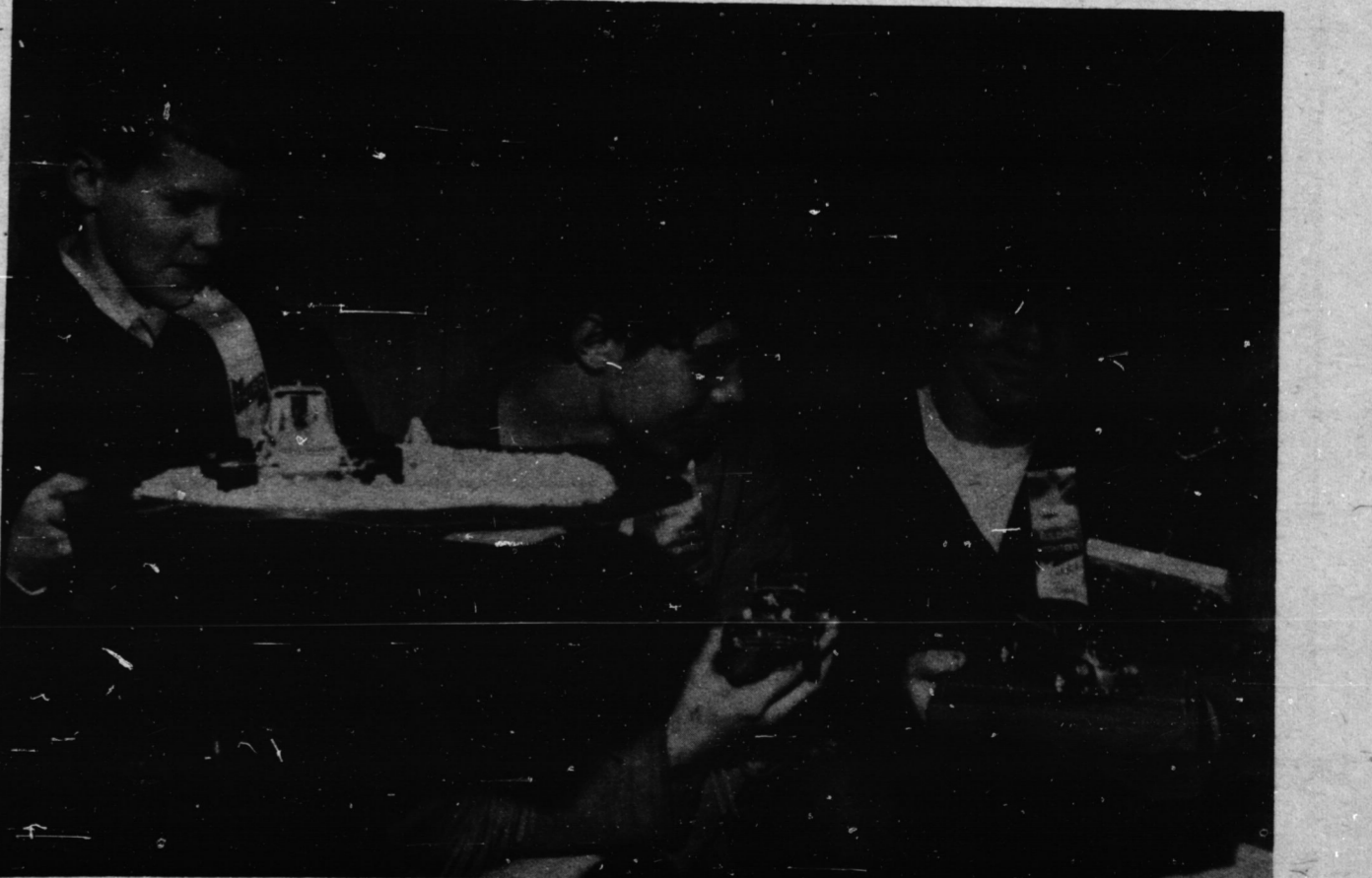
