The meeting opened with everyone repeating the Cancer Society Creed followed by the Lord's Prayer. The secretary Mrs. George Anderson and Treasurer Mrs. Andy Westerhuis gave their reports.

On The Farm Front

Testing soils for fertility requirements is the best economic guide to the use of fertilizers and lime for crop production. The soil testing laboratory at the University of Guelph tests about 50,000 samples for some 15,000 Ontario farmers each year. From a soil test, a farmer can find out whether the soil is deficient in one or more major elements and what amount of fertilizer is required for the most economic crop production. Ontario farmers may depend on the recommendations made through the University of Guelph and the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food as being the available.

The Haldimand Pork Producers (formerly Hog Producers) held their annual meeting last Thursday night. Their guest speaker, Mr. Doug Williams of the Ontario Food Council, pointed out the importance of an active promotion program. He also stressed the importance of producing the kind of pork our consumers are demanding.

Each year as income tax returns are filed, hundreds of dollars are lost because tax payers fail to take advantage of the many legitimate deductions and exemptions they are entitled to but often are unaware of. Your return is something that should be given serious attention - starting today.

Even before you begin to fill in your actual tax forms, start reviewing your 1970 bills and receipts. Make a list of all your tax deductible expenses. Find out if you would be better off by itemizing your various deductions, or by taking the standard allowances.

U.S. taxpayers can deduct a wide range of expenses, starting with medical care and medical car insurance premiums. State and local retail sales, gasoline, and income taxes, real estate taxes and personal property taxes can also be deducted. Add to that interest paid on your mortgage or personal note, charitable contributions,
