Dr. Hoffmann To Speak At Hagersville



Dr. Oswald Hoffmann, speaker on the International Lutheran Hour radio broadcast, will be the speaker at a Lutheran Hour Rally to be held at Hagersville Secondary School Auditorium, Sun. Oct. 31, 1971 at 3 p.m.

The weekly broadcast of the Lutheran Hour is heard in 41 languages by people in 125 different countries of the world. The program is sponsored by the Lutheran Layman's League, a Layman's organization of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod, with offices in St. Louis, Mo., and Kitchener, Ont. For 38 seasons of broadcasting, the message of Jesus Christ as the only way to salvation has been the central theme of every radio broadcast.

Approximately 2900 radio stations carried the special Christmas 1970 broadcast "Christmas in Norway," setting a new record for the widest coverage of any single independently produced program in radio history. The previous record was the Lutheran Hour's 1969 special Christmas broadcast, "Christmas in Hawaii."

Robert E. Schwyer, publicity chairman for the Lutheran Hour Rally in Hagersville stated that plans are also being made for a combined choir from various Lutheran Churches throughout the Niagara and Erie Zones, to provide music for the rally. They will be complemented by the Niagara Area Lutheran Choir, under the direction of Mr. Heinz Holder of St. Catharines, Ont.

The Rally is sponsored by the Erie Zone of the Ontario District Lutheran Laymen's League.
