

Girls To Be Accepted As Members Of Scout Rover Crews

"Any girl who joins a Rover crew does so as an individual not as an official member of the Girl Guides of Canada—Guides du Canada," according to a statement released today by Mrs. K. B. Clydale, chief commissioner of the Girl Guides of Canada—Guides du Canada. The chief commissioner made this statement at her organization's National Headquarters in Toronto in reply to an announcement from the National Ottawa office of the Boy Scouts of Canada that girls will be accepted as members of the Scout Rover crews.

"In the Girl Guides of Canada—Guides du Canada the age limits for rangers are 14 to 18. In the boy scouts the rover age group extends from 17 to 23, hence there is only a year or so of possible double involvement," the chief said. "However, the Girl Guides of Canada—Guides du Canada wishes to make it very clear that any such membership must be on an individual basis and not as an official member of the Girl Guides of Canada."

The chief stressed that her organization encourages joint activities; it does not advocate membership for boys in the guide organization, nor does it allow male leadership in its packs, companies or groups. She added that this did not preclude men as members of committees, in fact their assistance was welcome at any time.

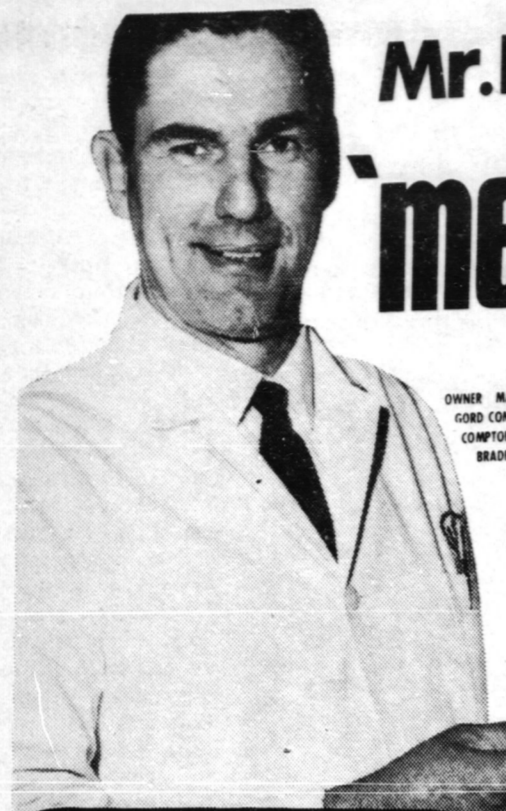

Hagersville Delays VON Decision

HAGERSVILLE — A council's decision on subsidizing the Victoria Order of Nurses division for Haldimand was delayed until it has heard replies from a survey of local doctors.

Reeve Jack Kincaid told council that one letter received from a local doctor said he was in favor of the VON organization if it is established along with a home care program.

The VON service does nursing care in the home while the home care program takes care of the regular household chores such as cooking and housekeeping.

Rev. Douglas Muir, who was a delegate at the meeting Monday, said that Caledonia has accepted the proposed VON program that will be helped by the same order in Brant.

He said the Haldimand-Norfolk Health Unit has been working on setting up a home care program.

"We certainly need the whole works if we can get it — the problem is getting it," said Mr. Muir.

At a meeting last month he told council the Order would probably only need outside financing the first year.

In other business council learned that an industry is interested in settling just outside the community in Walpole.

Reeve Kincaid said a letter from the Ontario Water Resources Commission had asked about the possibility of extending water and sewer facilities outside of the town.
