

## Snowmobiles May Be Banned In Hagersville

HAGERSVILLE — A bylaw to ban the operation of snowmobiles within the Village limits was debated at the inaugural meeting of council Monday.

Coun. Robert Gedye told council in the discussion he has had many complaints about the use of snowmobiles in the Village. He said he had discussed

the matter with Police Chief Ray Holden and he had told him the number of complaints about the machines had more than doubled those for the whole season last year.

"Chief Holden said he was in favor of banning the machines from the Village altogether," he said.

However, Deputy-reeve Ross Slote said he also had had a conversation with Chief Holden about the way snowmobiles were used in the Village.

He told me he would like to see a control bylaw for the machines, which would ban them from using the streets with the exception of excess and exit routes to and from the municipality.

Coun. Gedye also told council there should be some age limit on the operators of the machines. He said people as young as eight-years-old were operating them in Hagersville parks.

Council decided it would refer the whole matter to the police committee for a discussion with Chief Holden, also to wait to hear results of a public meeting scheduled for Jan. 14. Any action taken will be on the recommendation of the committee after its meeting and discussions at the public meeting.

In his inaugural speech Reeve Jack Kincaid told council his policy for the council for the next term is that "It work in harmony."

He also announced he was going to be available to the public to air their complaints or hear delegates for an hour each Friday afternoon.

"Delegations who ask to come to council will be told they will be heard between the hours of 8 to 9 pm.

"If they come to council after this hour they will be asked to attend the next meeting," he said.

Reeve Kincaid said he was making this rule so that items on the agenda could be looked after better.

In other business council passed a bylaw to sell a \$11,600 debenture to the Ontario Municipal Improvement Corporation at an interest rate of nine percent to help finance a digester for the sanitary sewer plant.

Asked for more information about 132-unit town housing and the services required for it before making any commitments.

Committees set up for the new term: Robert Gedye and Ross Slote were appointed for finance, planning and industrial development.

Norm Crawford and Nick Basili were appointed for the protection to persons and property.

Ross Slote and Mr. Gedye were appointed for public works.

Mr. Basili and Mr. Crawford were appointed for water and sewers.

### Jarvis To Use Temporary Zoning Plan

JARVIS — A temporary bylaw will be set up by the village until it can get its official plan approved by the Ontario Municipal Board.

This was the decision of council last night at its inaugural meeting.

Reeve W. E. Austin told council the two objectors to the proposed official plan will have ample opportunity to have their objections considered when hearings are conducted for the official plan.

"By having the objectors withdraw their objections now over a temporary plan it will save the Village the cost of having a hearing until the official plan is complete for presentation to OMB," he said.

Reeve Austin told council he was confident the temporary plan will only be

## \$5,850 Taken In Appliances

HAGERSVILLE — Breakin artists made off with \$5,850 worth of appliances from Culvers' Appliances Ltd. of 20 King St. E. Sunday night.

Chief Ray Holden of Hagersville Police told The Record that the thieves got into the store by crossing a roof of a next door neighbor, Mercer and Dixon, and used a TV tower in a five-foot alley between

the buildings to climb up to an air condition unit in a window. The unit was pried loose to gain entry to the building.

A back door was then forced open and the goods removed from there. A company truck was stolen to transport the goods.

The loot consisted of five black and white portable TVs, five stereo color TVs, three transistor radios, three

cassette recorders and two cassette tape players.

Chief Holden said Culvers' truck was recovered near Caistorville. Police also traced a rented truck, which was seen near the abandoned Culvers' truck Monday night but also found it minus the loot. The second truck had been rented in Hamilton.

Chief Holden said the appliance store had some insurance to cover the loss.
