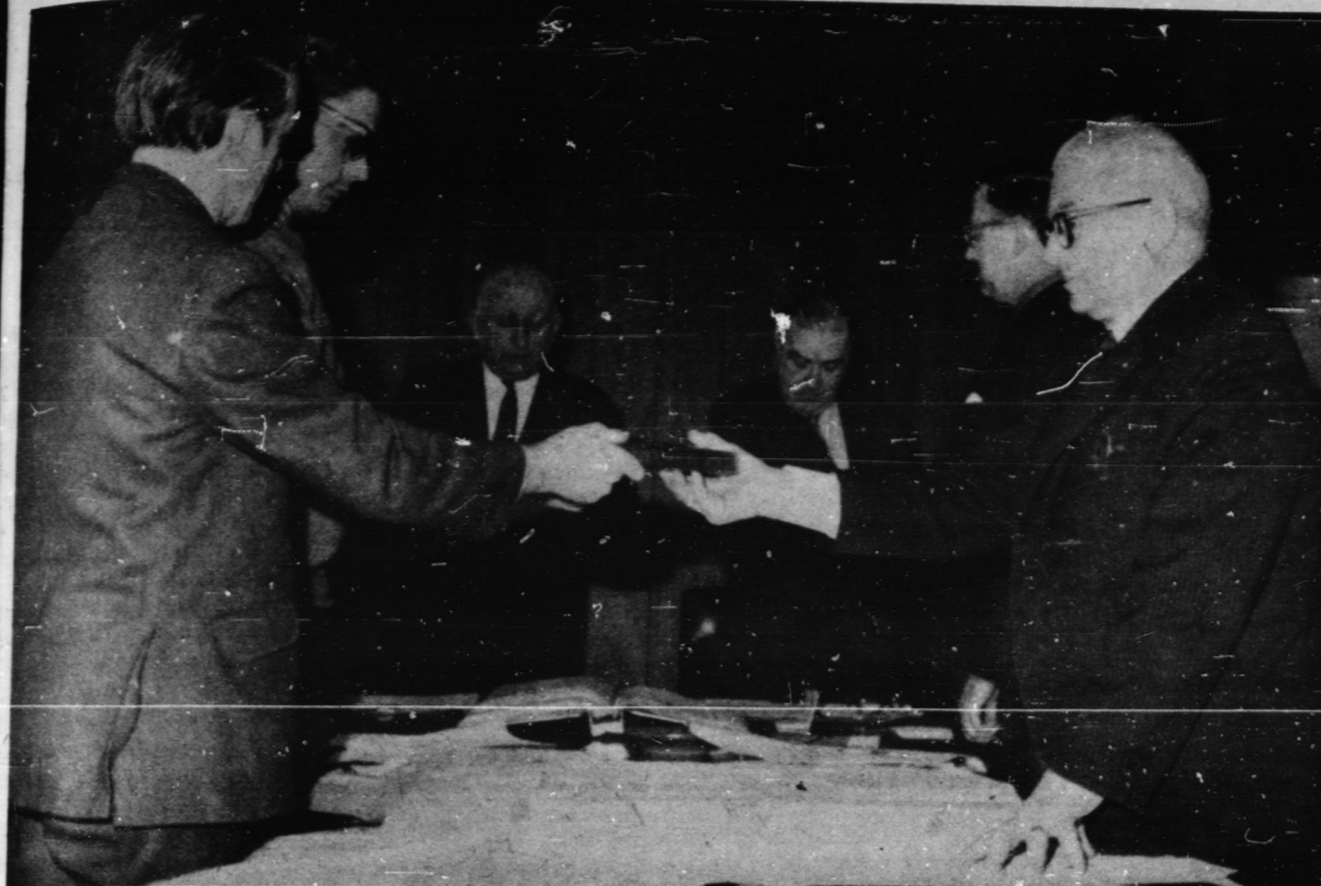
and equipment management, as well as other topics of interest to those taking part.

Reduced Rates

NANTICOKE - Bell Canada has introduced greatly reduced telephone rates here - effective Jan. 1 - after mapping out the built-up area of the town as a Locality Rate Area.

For customers within the Area, the basic monthly cost for a private home phone drops to \$4.95 from \$20.75.

Monthly rate for a two-party phone is now \$3.90, compared to \$13.05 before the change.

Bell planners keep an eye on communities throughout the company's territories. When development justifies a change to Locality status - new, lower rates are brought in.

C. Jukosky, Bell manager in this area, explains:

"It is obviously more expensive to provide urban-type service to customers who live in thinly-populated areas, than to those in high-density communities.

"Previously, Nanticoke customers with one and two-party service paid a mileage charge on top of the basic rate which represented the distance they were from the (Jarvis) exchange's switching centre."

All rates quoted above reflect the new increases granted to Bell by the Canadian Transport Commission in the recent rate hearing decision.

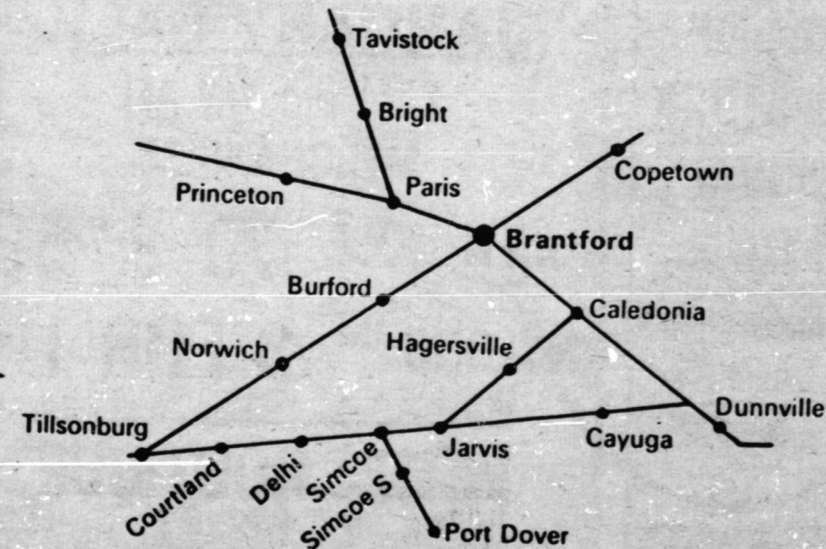
