Indications Show Earlier Start On Proposed Industrial Construction

Finance Minister Benson's announcement of a special corporation to assist expansion of Canadian owned companies is a good indication that things may start to move on the projected industrial expansion in this area much sooner than recent announcements indicated. In the announcement Mr. Benson said the initial money for the corporation of some \$200,000,000 would come from the federal government but would eventually come back from the public by the sale of shares.

It is a good bet that an industry such as Stelco will take advantage of such a bank especially if it means a much lower cost in purchasing money to finance it is proposed construction plans for a steel complex near Nanticoke.

Stelco announced in November it would not make a construction start this year because of the state of the economy and the high cost of money.

Texaco announced a delay because it said it wasn't sure whether the same type of refinery equipment would be needed in the past because of a move by other companies to refine lead free gasoline.

Another indicator is an upsurge again in interest in property around the area. Suddenly the real estate people have found themselves more than busy with enquiries and new option bids for property.

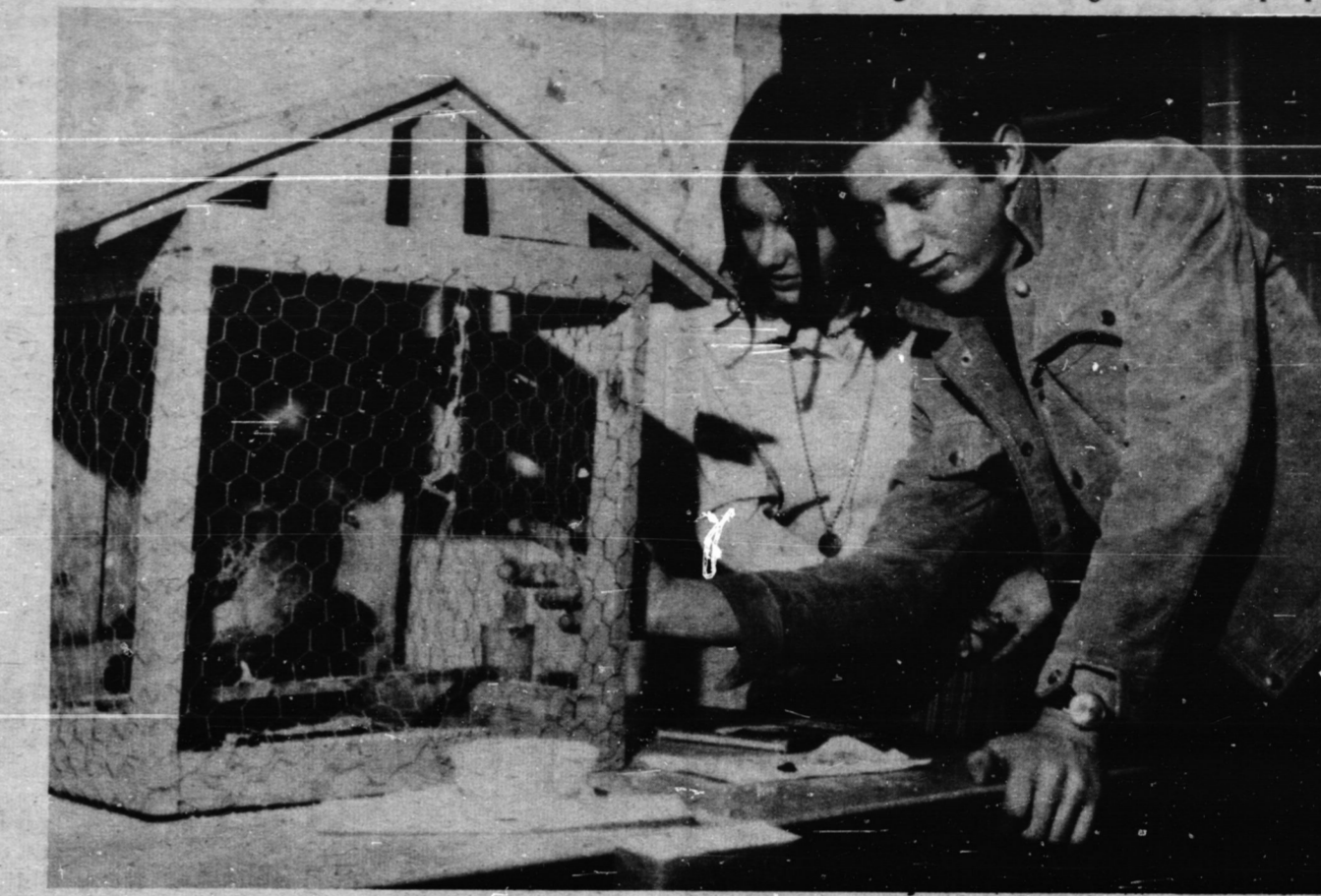
Pennell Appointed McMaster Chancellor

Argue Martin, chancellor of McMaster University since 1965, will retire in September he has been announced.

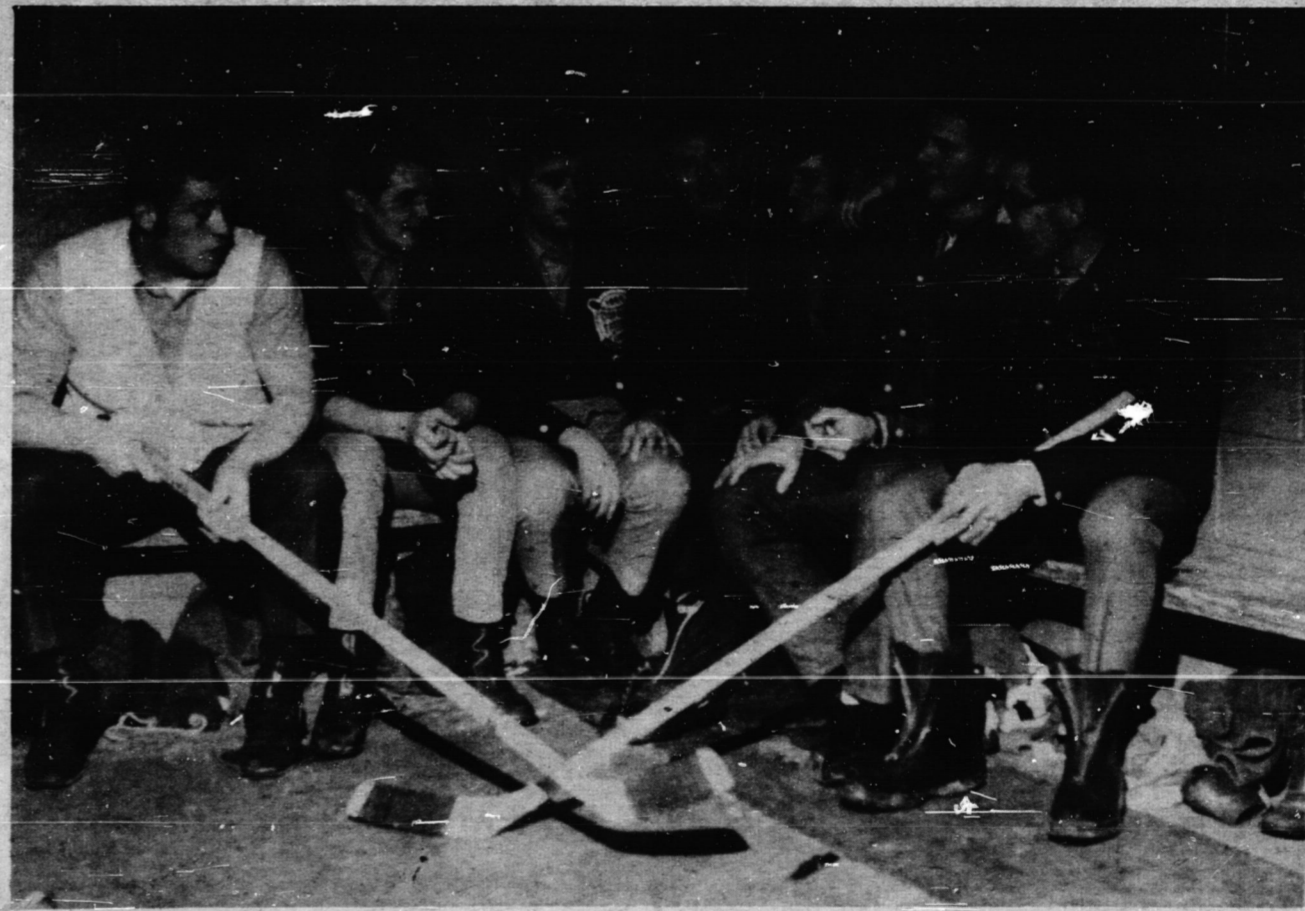
President Dr. Harry Rhoads, also announced that Mr. Justice Lawrence Pennell has been appointed to fill the position.

Mr. Pennell was a former MP for Haldimand. He graduated from McMaster in 1938. He was appointed to the High Court of Justice of Ontario in 1968 after retiring as Solicitor-General of Canada in the cabinet of Lester Pearson.

Last fall he was presented with an honorary doctor of law degree at McMaster's convocation.

Smith Acclaimed Warden Of Haldimand

CAYUGA - Reeve Clayton Smith of Seneca was acclaimed Warden of Haldimand at the county's inaugural meeting last week.

Mr. Smith, 63, will be the first warden to represent his township since 1946.

Judge W. W. Leach conducted the swearing in ceremonies at the meeting.

In his inaugural address Mr. Smith said this year will be a busy one for the county especially because it is hosting the International Plowing Match in October near Nanticoke.

He urged a more meaningful approach to public participation in local government.

Mr. Smith became a Seneca councillor in 1961

and served as deputy-reeve for two years and also reeve for two years. He is

president of the Haldimand Norfolk provincial Liberal association.

Council In Dilemma About Tender

HAGERSVILLE - Village council debated a letter it received from the Haldimand Board of Education stating a school

property would be put up for sale by tender.

Council had earlier made an offer to purchase the old high school property

located in the village.

Reeve Jack Kincaid told council he didn't know whether the village could legally tender for the property.

"We will have to get some legal advice on this," he said, "I don't think we have the authority to tender."

Coun. Norm Crawford suggested council could make some preparations to tender for the property in the meantime in case it was legal to do so.

Reeve Kincaid said he thought council should wait until it has consulted with the various people from the organizations who had indicated they would back council in its purchase of the property for a community park.

The Hagersville Athletic Association had sent a delegation to council last year suggesting the town purchase the property and that the organizations represented in the association would help raise money to repay the village.

"I think we should wait and see what these people think about the matter," he said.

In other business council decided to wait and observe what other municipalities were doing in controlling the use of snowmobiles.

Reeve Kincaid said he didn't think council wanted to pass a bylaw only to find it would have to rescind it later.

"I think we should wait until such time as we have more knowledge about policing snowmobiles before we pass a bylaw," he said.

At a public meeting held last week attended by some 125 people, it was decided to set up a safety program and an education program so that the people operating snowmobiles in the village would discipline themselves and operate the machines safely.

Council also:

Passed a resolution approving a 52-101 subdivision off Parkview Road to be developed by Haldimand Building Products Ltd.

Passed first and second reading on a bylaw to make an agreement with Ontario Water Resources Commission to make a municipal levy to finance water facilities in the west section.

Passed a first and second reading for a bylaw to enter an agreement with OWRC to levy to finance sewer facilities for the west section of the village.

Weekly Weather

Continued cold for the next few days is the regional outlook of the Simcoe Weather Bureau.

A slight moderation is expected for Saturday and possibly snow flurries.

Lows will be near zero with highs from 10 to 15 degrees, said the forecaster.
