Grant Conditional Wrecking Yard Licence

CAYUGA - A wrecking after a two-hour debate at up for consideration for the yard licence application from a local operator was approved with conditions

council Monday.

Reeve Ted Powell told the yard's proprietor, Roy council the licence has come Mathes, hasn't complied with the village bylaw.

"Each year we have been told that he would do so but we have found that nothing has been done."

To comply with the bylaw Mr. Mathes is required to construct a high fence to hide wrecked cars that are towed to his yard. The licence has to be renewed each year.

Coun. Robert Dell, who was on a committee with Phillip Neary to investigate the condition of the vard told council the man's "livlihood" depended on the operation and he would be the last to turn down the licence application.

"We were told by Mr. Mathes that he would erect the fence as soon as the weather is warm enough to do the work.

"I have taken the man's word and I won't vote to shut him down," he said. Coun. Charles Baird said

that he had been on council and heard the arguments for each year's application for a licence renewal and Mr. Mathes had yet to comply with the bylaw.

Reeve Powell suggested the council grant a conditionary licence. We could okay the licence until the end of August so that Mr. Mathes will have the time and weather conditions to comply with the bylaw.

"This has come up every year in the winter months when an excuse not to do the necessary work to comply with the bylaw is

Coun. Dell suggested that many of the village's bylaws

were not being enforced. "If we are going to enforce one we have got to

Coun. Mrs. Gwen Smith said if we are going to enforce all the bylaws we need someone to do it.

Council passed the compromise resolution to allow a conditionary licence unanimously.

It was conceded council had constructed buildings of its own without charging a building permit fee.


However, since the school is a district school the. permit fee of \$420 possibly shouldn't be waived. The matter came up
