Earl Ross of Alisa, Craig, Ont., hung on to the runnerup spot on the checker ahead of Art Clark of West Seneca N.Y. in a '71 Challenger, Pet Hudson of Rexdale and Kenny Cassel of Buffalo, N.Y., both piloting Chevys.

Kitchen, Reimer and Scannell were heat winners in the late models while Daniels and Siemers copped the Mini's and Kuwabara, Glaser and Young were TQ victors.

(CP) - Ken Harrelson, a colorful, sometimes proficient American League first baseman, surprised many people recently when he quit baseball to attempt a career in professional golf.

Harrelson, hitting about .200 with Cleveland Indians, couldn't stand the frustration of major league baseball any longer.

He predicted he would enjoy much greater success hitting a golf ball. It's smaller, but at least it just lies there waiting to be hit and doesn't curve, flutter or drop.

Can the long-haired, uninhibited Harrelson, who shoots in the 70s, make a living on the golf tour? Opinion is divided.

Cleveland manager Alvin Dark suggested without elaborating that Harrelson's personality was better suited to golf than baseball. Dark said he thought Harrelson would make out okay.

Others, however, said that it would be tough at the age of 29 to take up a different sport.

Only time will tell. Many athletes have played two different professional sports, but few have excelled at both. The majority, perhaps spreading their concentration and time too widely, have proved merely run-of-the-mill at both.

One of the more recent examples was Gene Conley, a six-foot-eight giant, who pitched for several major-league baseball teams in the 1950s and early 1960s as well as performing in the National Basketball Association.

Conley would complete the NBA season in early April, then report for baseball. Often he had no spring training.

He enjoyed some pitching success with the Braves, Phillies and Red Sox, and served merely as a reserve forward with Boston Celtics of the NBA.

His inexperience on playing both sports irritated baseball officials, who felt a concentrated, full-time effort on pitching would have brought Conley far more fame and money.

Pitcher Steve Hamilton, now with San Francisco Giants, and shortstop Dick Groat, now retired but a former National League all-star with the Pirates and Cardinals, both played briefly in the NBA. They quit basketball to concentrate on baseball, and have never been sorry.

Jack Caffrey, a Canadian, attempted to mix hockey and baseball - perhaps the only man ever to combine the two. He flopped, making it only to the Triple A level in baseball and the American Hockey League during the winter.

Maybe if he had come to a conclusion and stayed with one sport, he could have been more successful. The lesson for Harrelson is don't try to mix golf and baseball. He tried baseball and met just fair success. His decision to abandon it completely to try golf is probably wise. At least that way, he's giving himself a full chance.
