## When Fish Get Mad

Fish, unlike fashion conscious women, aren't seduced by the latest in fashion when it comes to strike. Why they attempt to eat metal, plastic, hair and other phonies thrown their way is subject to only one assumption, they are probably the truth.

But Red Fisher, the angling expert at Mercury outboards, wonders if this could possibly be true of

the many multicolored, star-spangled spoons and plugs which are used daily to catch fish somewhere. And who ever saw a live six-inch-long purple worm sliding across the bottom of a lake?

Biologists know that fish can see, and well enough to distinguish colors and shapes. Why, then, do they strike lures that don't resemble any natural food they've ever known?

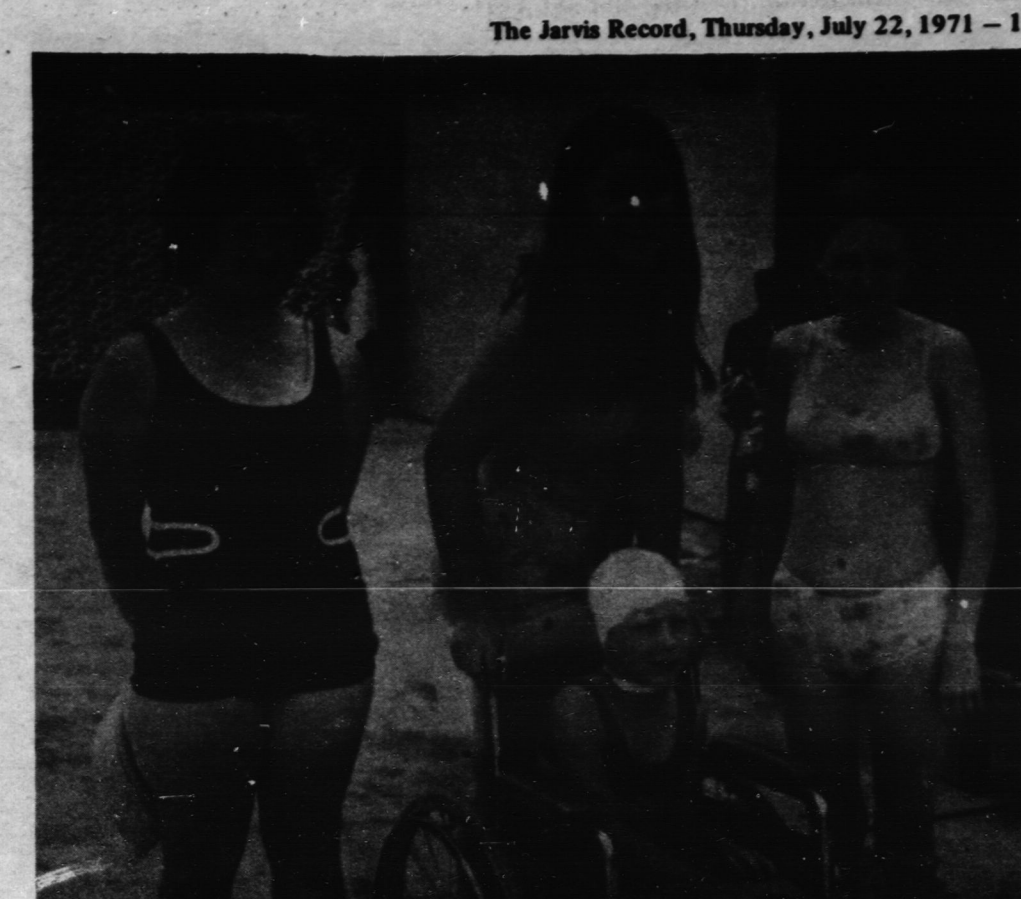
Anger is a logical answer to be considered. Studies of fish behavior toward natural prey show that seldom is there any display of the savagery so characteristic of the slashing strike a fish makes at an artificial lure.

There are exceptions to this, of course, say the lads at Mercury, but observations of predacious fish indicate they prefer to get food without drawing attention to themselves. Since most animals are subject to being eaten by another animal higher on the chain of life, this quiet approach to securing food makes sense.

Yet, when it comes to manufactured lures, fish lose their timidity and strike angrily at what obviously are not natural foods for them.

## Luther Marsh Established By Signing Of Agreement

An agreement between the Hon. Rene Brunelle, minister of lands and forests and Mr. James Bauer, chairman of the Grand River conservation authority establishing Luther Marsh as a wildlife management area, was marked by an official ceremony at the marsh. The agreement formalized the co-operative management of Luther Marsh in programs designed to achieve its wildlife potential and to give the public the opportunity for quality hunting, recreation and education.

Luther Marsh is located partly in West Luther township of Wellington county and partly in East Luther township of Dufferin county, a few miles to the northwest of the Village of Grand Valley and Highway 9. The management area includes about 12,500 acres of water (Lake Luther) and surrounding land.

Management of the marsh by the authority and the department has been in effect for the last year and considerable improvements have already been made such as boat launching ramps and observation towers. Extensive crop management on lands within the area provides migrating waterfowl with food and refuge. Further developments, designed to assist the amateur recreationalist and ornithologist, will be made by placing more observation platforms and viewing blinds.

To provide better hunting, some restrictions on hunter movements were made last year when only two access points were open. This coming fall, the number of hunters will be restricted to about 800, which is considerable less than the 1,200 to 1,400 sportsmen in previous years. This should result in more pleasing hunting, better harvest control, and reduce the undesirable effects of disturbance.

Luther Marsh has an excellent selection of breeding waterfowl and associated waterbirds such as Wilson's phalarope and ospreys, which also nest there along with herons, bittern and rails.

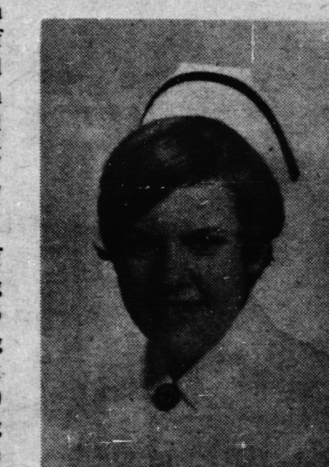
A resident flock of Canada geese is being maintained in the area to establish a breeding population. The flock numbers 170 birds and 20 pairs are presently setting up nesting homes. The young birds will be left free flying so they may migrate and return the following year to breed.

In the long term objectives for the Luther Marsh Wildlife Management Area an interpretive centre for education and appreciation of the natural environment is also being considered.

The technical advisory committee for Luther Marsh is to be commended for the preparation of the new management plan. This committee consists of A.W. Beattie, N.R. Oldfield and I. Kao representing the Grand

River Authority, and W.D. Mansell, J.J. Armstrong and J.B. Dawson representing the department of lands and forests.
