

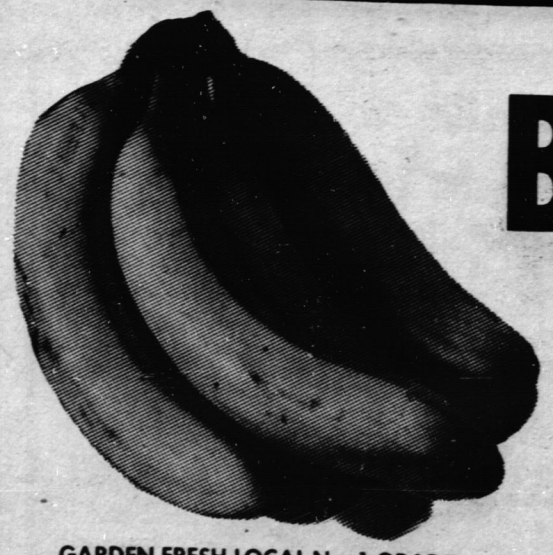

Jarvis firemen responded to two alarms last week.

One, Tuesday, was in salvage on the back of a truck owned by Murray Fleek.

Several motorists following the truck reported old car bodies and other salvage material was ablaze. An unidentified motorist had slowed the blaze with a dry chemical before firemen arrived but they finished the job. The fire was reported at 12.45 p.m. The incident took place on Highway 6 a mile north of here.

On Sunday the department was summoned to a fire in a car owned by Mrs. Helen Bundy of Port Dover.

The fire was put out by an unidentified motorist. The car was at the intersection of Rainham Road and the Nanticoke Side Road when the fire was discovered. The blaze was reported at 3 p.m. Damage was estimated by Chief George Walker at \$200.

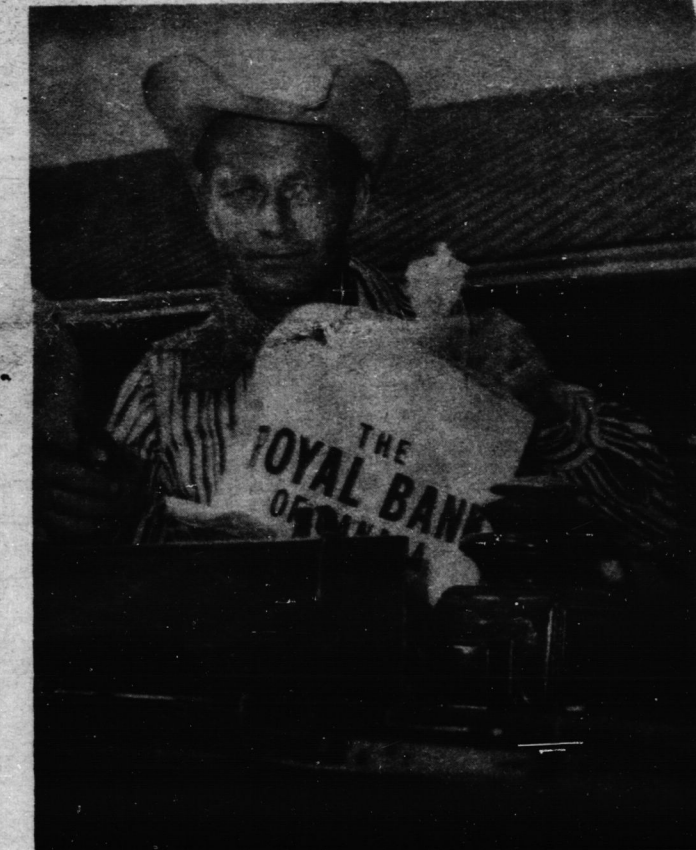
## Man Killed In Fire

NANTICOKE - Norris Williams, 37, of Van Horne Ave., Willowdale, was killed in a flash fire in an electrical equipment room in the number one power house here Thursday.

Co-worker, Walter Urbanowicz was injured. He was treated for burns to his left forearm.

Officials said the fire was apparently caused by a 600 volt cable on a scaffold but this is being investigated by Cayuga OPP. Investigating the matter are Consts. Walter Eaves and P. J. Helferty.

The accident was reported at 9 p.m. Dr. W.C. Mills of Dunnville was the coroner. The fatality was the first in nearly three years of construction at the Nanticoke Hydro site.
