

On The Green

Everyone participating in lawn bowling is aware of the interest at this time of the year in the various competitions. There is word of some bowlers in the area competing for the Ontario Championships. As result everyone is quite concerned with the rules of the game. The following definitions give a better understanding of the rules.

Definitions:
(a) "Controlling Body" means the body having immediate control of the conditions under which a match is played. The order shall be - (1) The International Bowling Board. (2) The National Bowling Association. (3) The State Division, Local District or Provincial Association. (4) The Club on whose green the match is played.
(b) "Skip" means the player who, for the time being is in charge of the head on behalf of the team.
(c) "Team" means either a four, triples or a pair.
(d) "Side" means any agreed number of teams

whose combined scores determine the result of the match.

(e) "Four", means a team of four players whose position in order of playing are named lead, third, skip.
(f) "Bowl in Course" means a bowl from the time of its delivery until it comes to rest.
(g) "End" means the playing of the Jack and all the bowls of all the opponents in the same direction on a rink.
(h) "Head" means the Jack and such bowls as have come to rest within the boundary of the rink and are not dead.
(i) "Mat Line" means the edge of the mat which is nearest to the front ditch. From the centre of the mat line all necessary measurements to the Jack or bowls shall be taken.
(j) "Master Bowl" means a bowl which has been approved by the IBB as having the minimum bias required, as well as in all other respects complying with the Rules of the Game and is engraved with the words "Master Bowl".
(k) "Jack High" means that the nearest portion of the Bowl referred to is in line with and at the same distance from the Mat Line as the nearest portion of the Jack.
(l) "Pace of Green" means the number of seconds taken by a bowl from the time of its delivery to the moment it comes to rest, approximately 30 yards from the Mat Line.

(CP) - Baseball's Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y., has taken a giant step forward.

But the move should have been made years ago. It has decided that Leroy (Satchel) Paige, legendary pitching ace of the Negro baseball leagues, and other black stars of the pre-1947 era will be inducted directly into the Hall of Fame rather than be honored in a special section.

But the move didn't come in a straightforward fashion. Earlier this year, the Hall of Fame announced that a separate wing of the museum was being set aside for players in the Negro leagues, before black players were admitted to the all-white major leagues, and Paige was chosen as the first player to be honored in the wing.

However, an understandable storm of indignation about the "separate-but-equal" treatment for the former stars of the Negro leagues followed.

As a result, Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn and Paul Kirk, president of the National Baseball Hall of Fame, announced that Paige and future inductees would be given full membership in the main Hall of Fame. Seven new

color line by Jackie Robinson in 1947. He deserves to be in the Hall of Fame, and it's coming about. Rightly so.

Also scheduled to be inducted are newcomers to the Hall selected by the Oldtimers Committee - Outfielders Harry Hooper and Chick Hafey, infielders Davey Bancroft, Joe Kelley and Jake Beckley; pitcher Rube Marquard and George Weiss, former general manager of the New York Yankees and Mets.

Selection of stars of the Negro leagues for induction into the Hall will continue on the same basis as the naming of Paige, by vote of the recently created Baseball Hall of Fame Committee of the Negro Baseball League.

Paige previously was not eligible for induction into the Hall of Fame because he had not played the required 10 years in the major leagues.

In Kansas City, Paige seemed surprised at the relaxation of the rules involving the 10-year requirement and said: "It's the greatest thing that ever happened to me in baseball."

"I guess they really found out I was really worthy. I appreciate it to the highest."

Paige noted: "You're supposed to be in the majors 10 years to get in the Hall of Fame. I barnstormed with the top players in the American and National leagues. I guess they're putting that together with five years in the majors."

"That would make 25 or 30 years." Paige played for Cleveland 1948-49, the old St. Louis Browns 1951-53 and the old Kansas City as in 1965.

Paige was probably the greatest pitcher in black baseball history prior to the breaking of the major league
