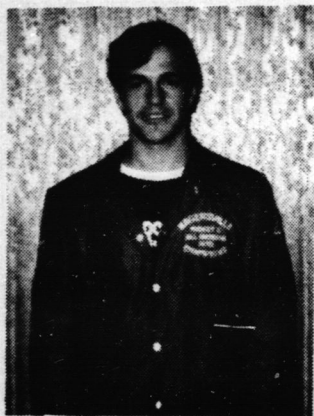

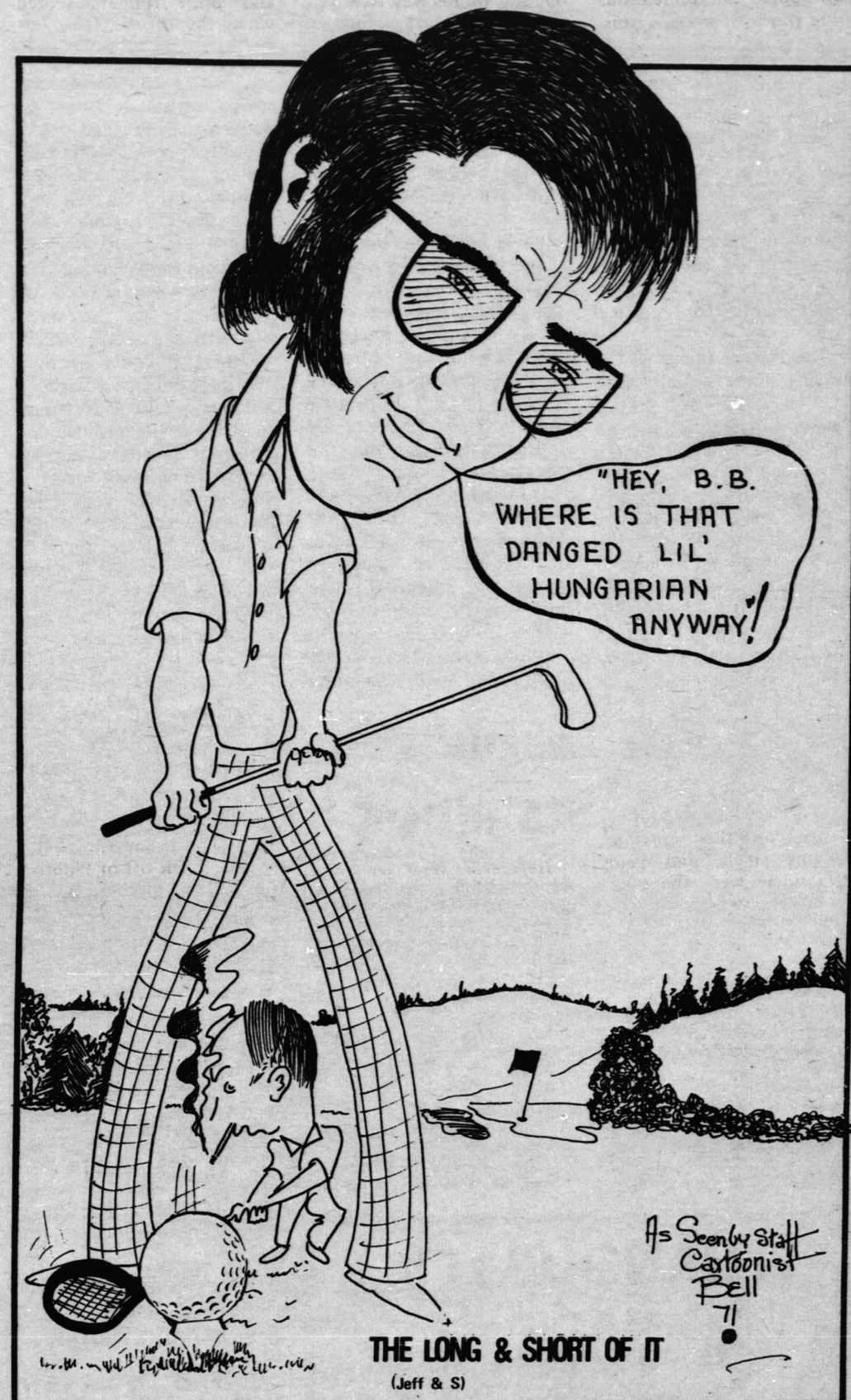
the accuracy of the B.S. tee shots and the uncanny display of putting.

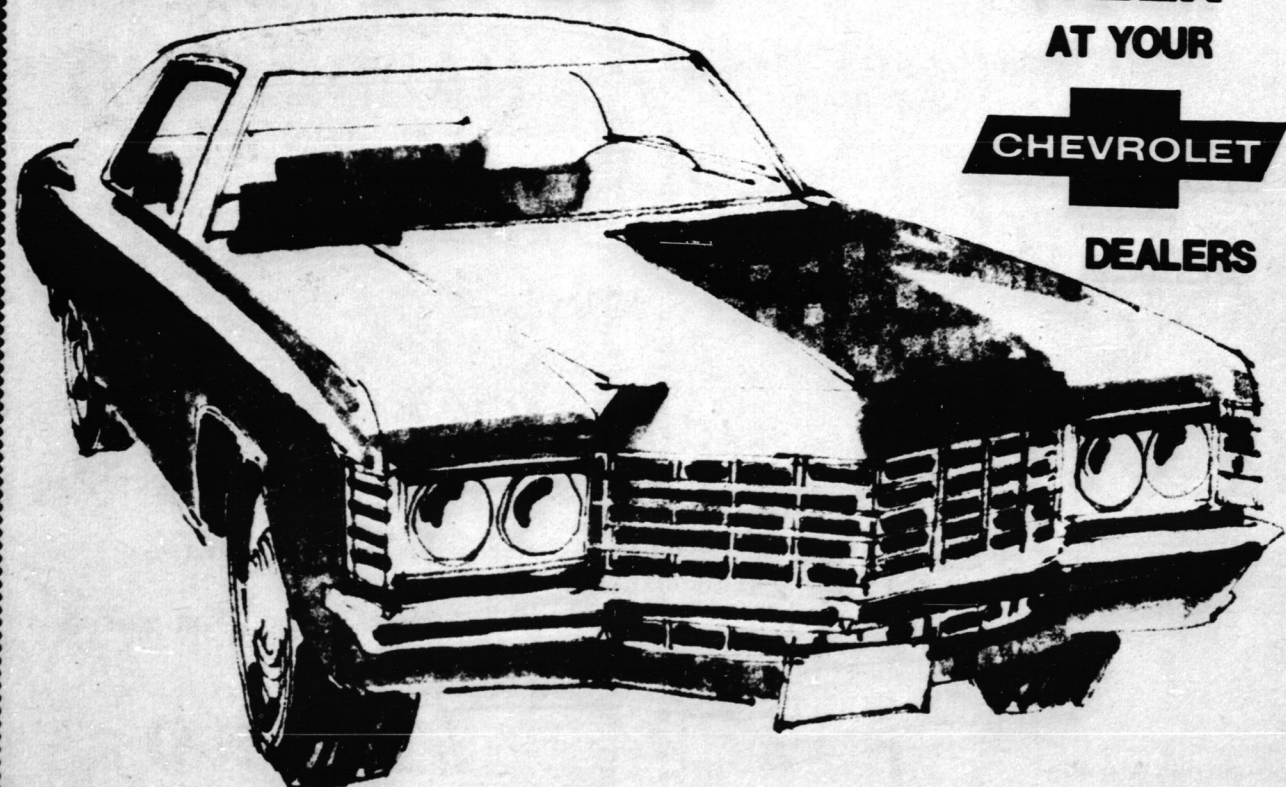
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
