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Federation News

The quality of our air and water is now a subject of vital concern to most people and thus air and water pollution is one of the most important problems of our time.

The Federation of Agriculture, in step with present and future problems involving pollution, briefed the Ontario legislature on the farmers stand on pollution and presented them with our recommendations. Some of these recommendations have been discussed in a preceding column and shall now be continued.

One such recommendation is that the government of Ontario should ensure that it does not penalize operators who will not adopt doubtful pollution control procedures. This is due to the present lack of information on pollution control techniques and disagreement among the experts on the effectiveness of these methods. As a result no one is in a position to guarantee that some recommended controls will work and quite naturally no farmer is willing to spend the extra money out of his own pocket for a useless piece of equipment.

Today in Ontario, our farm society is unfortunately feeling the growing pains and pressure of a rapid urbanization move. The following recommendation that farmers who face zoning restrictions imposed by a department of government should be compensated for their loss of income or the loss of marketability of title stems from this ever-increasing problem. The OFA also recommends that the Ontario government programs to assure that farm owners are left no worse off after rezoning than before.

Of course, the major stumbling block in the path of pollution control is the cost, which the average Ontario farmer is simply not able to afford. With this in mind, the OFA presented in their brief a recommendation that where pollution control measures require a substantial capital outlay, the Ontario government make available partially forgivable and or low interest loans for this purpose.

However, this point is one battle which the OFA can write off their list since they were, in turn, informed that this favor is already available for industry and farmers may also take advantage of the extra capital.

Although pollution control is a recognized necessity in our society

today, personal finance also plays an important role in the capabilities of one person to contribute his share for the cause. The

A vote of thanks tendered by Miss Miller. Mrs. Lily acted as auctioneer, and is not meeting during and August.

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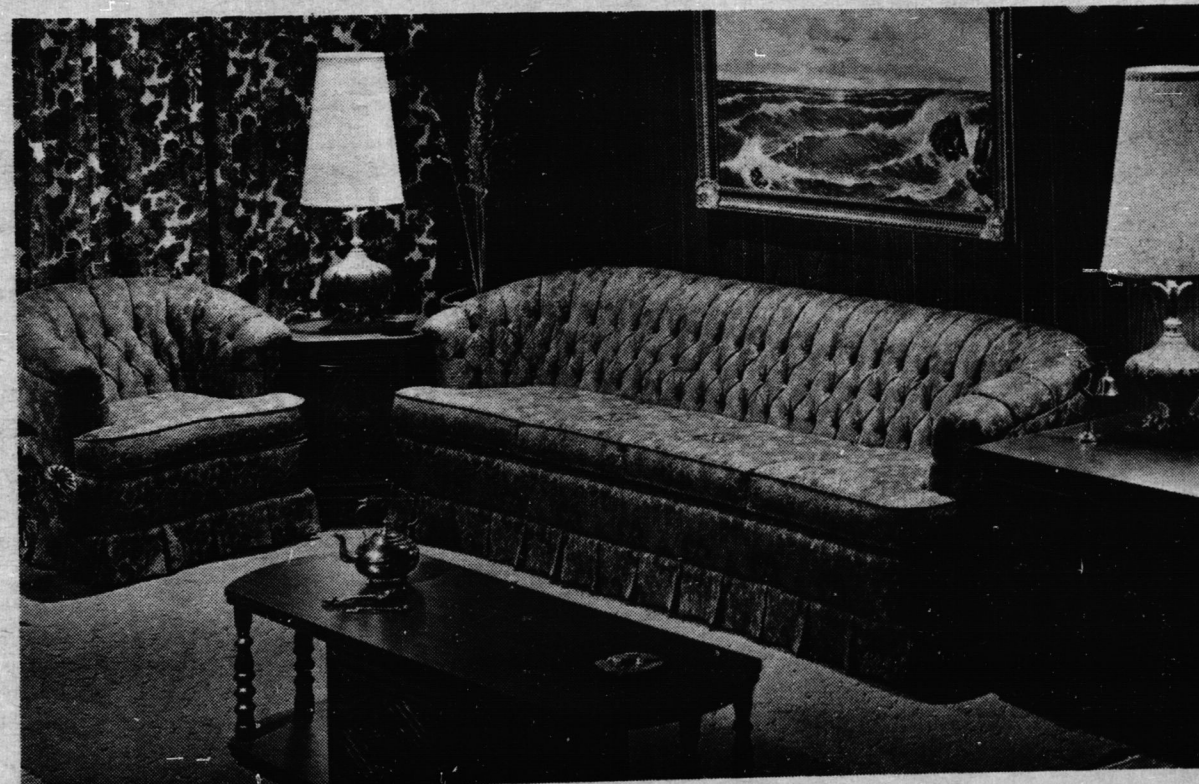
