

On The Farm Front

Emergency chemical control of quackgrass in corn calls for about double the usual application of atrazine plus the emulsifiable mineral oil. Three to four pounds of atrazine (active) and 1½ gallons of oil are

recommended per acre. This treatment requires that corn be grown on the field for a second year.

There are other methods that could be used before the corn crop is up for control of quack and annual grasses. If atrazine is applied

as above before annual grasses reach the three-leaf stage it provides a generally good to excellent weed control. The oil-water emulsion method provides an improved post-emergence activity of atrazine especially on quackgrass and annual weed species.

Tractor noise is reaching levels that can be permanently harmful to farmers by lowering their ability to hear. Evidence indicates that those subjected to high noise

levels for extended periods will suffer permanent hearing damage. Practically all tractors exceed the U.S. noise exposure limits when operated for eight hours or longer per day.

The immediate solution apparently is to wear protective devices such as ear plugs or acoustical ear muffs. The long term solution would likely be to lower the noise output of farm tractors. According to our source of information, when European legislation established maximum noise

levels the manufacturers were able to meet the requirements.

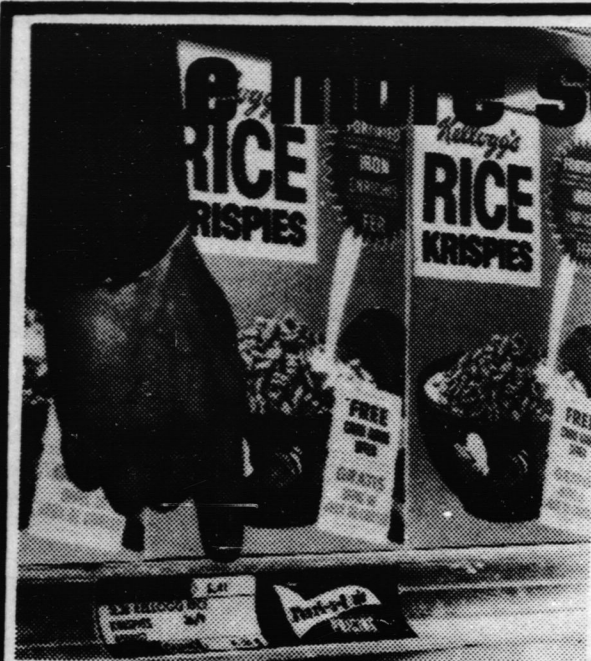
