

West Haldimand WI 22nd Annual Meeting

On May 28, 1971, in Faith Centennial Church, Selkirk, Mrs. Wm. Lamb, president, welcomed a good attendance at the annual meeting.

Following registration and opening exercises, Rev. Bechtel led in devotions, emphasizing that Christian love and understanding are just as important in the home today as in the days of Adelaide Hoodless, whose determination led to the founding of the WI.

Mrs. R. A. Miller, a veteran member, and a leader in Institute work, was presented with a lovely corsage, it being the occasion of her birthday. She very appropriately replied, and reminisced of her early experiences in WI activities.

Mrs. G. Bassindale read the minutes of the last annual meeting and dealt with correspondence.

Mrs. Lorna Miller, from Dunnville, spoke regarding the Plowing Match, as to displays, exhibits, tent space supplied, and means of advertising our county this year.

A letter concerning TB and respiratory diseases, was read and Mrs. J. Hunter named delegates to attend meetings the third Wednesday in every month. Mrs. M. Dredge, delegate to Guelph Conference,

presented a very complete report, the theme being, "Thought and Learning are Worthless Unless Put Into Action." Many projects may be undertaken to promote a better image of the WI: Serve the fight against pollution; Get younger members interested in WI work; Have talent nights; Keep business short; Put on a backwards skit; Have a fun night. Our organizations are made up of four kinds of people: The wishing bone; Jaw bones; Knee bones; and the Back bone.

Mrs. Wm. Mitchell, FWLO Board member, spoke at some length of the work and reports connected with Subdivision 18. There will be a new handbook available in 1972, and the WI will be celebrating its 70th year in 1972. Resolutions were dealt with and one emergency resolution was brought before the group. The secretary was instructed to send letters of protest to the necessary municipal and county levels in Haldimand. Mr. and Mrs. Loveless are the new hostesses at the Adelaide Hoodless Homestead.

Greetings were brought from the head table guests, who included Reeve Gordon Miller and Mrs. Miller, Mrs. Otto Crone, Miss Janice Fox, Miss Valerie Bradford, Mr. Max Ricker, Mr. Ken Best, Mr. Best urged promotion of 4-H clubs, as there are 2500 young people in the county with only 350 active in 4-H work.

There were several posters by grade five pupils, throughout the room, displaying ways of advertising the Plowing Match. Several splendid displays of paper mache (made by the Branches that took the course) were assembled at the back of the auditorium.

A lively sing-song lead by Mrs. Kernahan, assisted by Mrs. Hurst, was enjoyed by all, as an opening for the afternoon session.

Mrs. Miller spoke further on the Plowing Match, telling us that there will be a tent, displaying crafts of Haldimand County, with a ladies' program scheduled for each day from 11 a.m.

to 3.30 p.m. Each Institute is to bring donated prizes to the Fall conference.

Reports were given and received from all standing committee conveners, all showing good progress and almost 100 percent reporting. A new Institute has been organized in the York area, now bringing our total to 16 branches and congratulations are offered on their endeavour.

Mrs. V. Smith filled in on plans and requirements for the banquet catering. Waitresses and hostesses will wear white dresses and green or red checked aprons. requested for each table being served. Mention was also made of activities in the WI booth, such as food demonstration by the Gas Co., a fashion show by Walker Stores, and during the day lucky draws will be made.

New Bishop Consecrated For Niagara Diocese

Canon John Bothwell was consecrated a Bishop in the Church on June 11 at the Anglican Cathedral in Hamilton which was packed to the doors and beyond.

The service was telecast in color on Channel 11 last Sunday at 3 p.m. Cannon Bothwell was presented to the Archbishop of Algoma, who is the Metropolitan Bishop of the Province of Ontario by the Bishops of Niagara and Huron who were the three bishops necessary to consecrate a bishop.

The sermon was preached by the Primate of all Canada, the Most Rev. Edward Scott, formerly the Bishop of Kootenay, British Columbia.

Some 20 bishops in all attended and took part, most of the clergy of the Diocese and many others including representatives of the Roman Catholic, United and Presbyterian Churches.

Cool Sandwiches For Safe Picnics

Picnics and sandwiches go hand in hand all through the warm weather. Unfortunately, sandwiches do not travel well in warm weather unless they are kept well chilled. Special care must be taken with sandwiches made with meat, poultry, fish and eggs. These fillings may cause food poisoning if they are not kept properly chilled. Picnic coolers and ice are the two best ways to keep food cool on warm days. For those who do not have a good picnic cooler, food specialists at the Ontario Food Council, Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food suggest the following ways to keep sandwiches cool and safe.

Sandwiches will keep well chilled when they are made with frozen sliced bread. This has several advantages besides keeping the sandwich filling safe, butter is easier to spread because the bread doesn't crumble and tear: the chill in the

bread keeps even lettuce crisp and cool: and the bread retains the characteristic texture of fresh bread when it thaws. Freezing unopened cans of fruit juice is another way to keep picnic sandwiches cold. This has the added

benefit of providing a very cold refreshing picnic beverage when thawed. Don't spoil a beautiful day with a limp lunch and possible food poisoning. Take the proper precautions to keep all picnic foods cold.
