Retirement looks inviting to aging National Hockey League players in the heat of the summer, but the crisp air of fall and the lure of a major-league pay cheque cause many changes of heart.

Tim Horton and Donnie Marshall are a couple of examples.

Horton, 41, went to Pittsburgh Penguins from New York Rangers and Marshall, 39, was claimed by Toronto Maple Leafs from Buffalo Sabres in the recent intra-league draft.

Both met the news with apathy and indicated there was a good chance of their retiring. But, the odds are that both will be wearing NHL uniforms again come next October.

Salaries for established NHL players have soared since expansion. It's difficult to turn down the kind of money that these two players will be offered.

Marshall apparently had indicated to manager-coach Punch Imlach of the Sabres that he would not play next season. But he probably was looking ahead at that time to another dismal season with Buffalo, which is likely to finish out of the playoffs again.

A role as a part-time player and penalty killer with the Maple Leafs, whose playoff chances are much better than Buffalo's could help alter his plans.

The Maple Leafs seem to be thinking of Marshall as a "caddy" for Dave Keon that is using him to spell off Keon and take over some of Keon's appearances as a penalty killer.

Young players, with plenty of years remaining, don't mind performing with an also-ran. A veteran like Marshall undoubtedly would rather play a limited

role with a contender full-time with a mediocre team.

Horton's case, however, is somewhat different. He is moving from a contender team - one of the four best in the league - to one of the worst.

Money undoubtedly will be the main attraction. The Penguins, under ownership, will want him as a respectable player, as possible to help attendance.

An experienced defenceman like Horton could make the difference between reaching or not reaching the playoffs. The worth a few thousand dollars, Pittsburgh management should be able to make that decision.

A return to Pittsburgh for Horton is ironic. He played his professional career with the old Pittsburgh Pirates of the American Hockey League in the late 1940s.

A good bet is that the 1971-72 salary will be about 12 times larger than that paid to him in his last tenure.

Horton is active in a variety of business ventures in Ontario, but not many businessmen can make \$80,000 or so in seven months of work.

Dead Elm Removal Safety Hints

Farmers removing dead and dying elm trees should take special safety precautions, says farm safety specialist Hal Wright, of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food. He offers several hints to prevent injury or death.

Always wear a safety hat. Never cut trees alone. A second operator nearby will ensure help should an emergency arise. At the same time, make sure no

one is in the vicinity of falling trees.

Watch out for "widow makers" - dead limbs which may break off during cutting. If the limbs appear likely to break off, use a cable and tractor to shake them off, making sure the cable is longer than the height of the tree. Fasten the cable as high as possible on the tree.

Use wedges as little as possible. The shock of driving them in could cause the dangerous top limbs to break off.

Watch out for partially concealed staples or fence wire if the tree is in a fence row.
