A Big Moving Job!

PORT DOVER - A big job was started from Monday as a 10-man crew of Lackie Bros. Ltd. of Port Dover started a trip to a 215 ton transformer in its landing place to the lake.

Some difficulties were encountered along the route as the wheels of the float, because of weight, sunk even through tarry.

However, with a crane in back pushing and a big Mac truck pulling, the

transformer was moved along the route at 4 m.p.h.

A spokesman for the moving company said the crew had difficulty Monday morning getting permission on what routes the machine would take but clearance to start moving came a little after 1 p.m.

The moving was laid over for the night a little west of a special bridge built on a concession road to enable it to be taken across a creek.

From Port Dover to this point it had taken until 11 p.m. at night to make about half the journey. It arrived at the station Tuesday at 11 a.m.

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Three Killed In Weekend Crashes

JARVIS - Two men were killed at an accident crossing on the line of the CNR on the Nanticoke Sideroad a mile east of here Sunday.

Dead are Bruno Joseph, 22, of Sturgeon Falls and Gerald Henri, 27, of St. Thomas.

Police said the pair were on their vehicle the impact of a 12-car train under the control of engineer Edward of St. Thomas. The

train was westbound.

Police said Smelser was eastbound when he veered onto the north shoulder of the road, and struck the concrete abutment of the Stoney Creek bridge on Con. 5, of Rainham Township.

Surviving are his parents, sisters Barbara and Shari, brothers David, Larry and Sheldon, also grandparents.

Yellow Substance Pollution Mystery

NANTICOKE - Two members of the Walpole Township Citizen's Action Association, Bill Ross and George Golding, who reside in lake front homes west of Sandusky Sideroad discovered patches of a yellow - mustard - colored substance floating in Erie close to their residences yesterday.

President Howard Nicklin, of the association told The Record they immediately alerted Ed Gazley, a WTCAA Director, who tried repeatedly to have an Ontario Hydro official come and inspect what appeared to be a possible pollution hazard.

After a great time lapse a public relation officer from Hydro - Collin Hendry - arrived on the scene.

Mr. Nicklin asks why Hydro doesn't have an official at the Nanticoke Hydro site 24 hours a day because of the construction program and possible danger

of oil spills and other pollution hazards.

The yellow substance was sighted as far away as three miles from the Hydro site.

A Hydro spokesman said that it is more than possible the yellow substance came from a source other than the construction site at Nanticoke and not connected in any way with Ontario Hydro.
