

Northern Canoe Routes Outlined In New Book

Whether you are an enthusiastic canoeist or merely an "arm chair" paddler, a new lands and forests booklet called Northern Ontario Canoe Routes will set your mind straying in the direction of a different kind of thrill-packed vacation, following many of the routes taken by early fur traders and robust vacationers.

Northern Ontario Canoe Routes is not for the faint-hearted. All of the many trips outlined here are challenging; some of them are somewhat hazardous and should not be attempted by a novice canoe handler or inexperienced camper. Prepared by the parks and recreation areas branch of the department, the 82 page booklet contains explanatory maps, drawings, tips on camping, and a good list of books dealing with this popular recreational activity. "Purple Chicken" Embarking On A 30 Mile Ride

Young people in Hagersville and area are involved in organizing a Youth Centre "The Purple Chicken" in the village. Following their successful bake sale recently, they are enthusiastically planning a Bike-A-Thon on June 26, over a 30 mile course. Participants will leave on the ride encompassing Hagersville from the town park, and it is hoped that those participating will be from all age groups.

Organizers Bill Hickey, Brian Jackson, Les Anderson and Debbie Auger are arranging for medical services, refreshments, check points and routes. Refreshments will be supplied at each check point and at various points along the 30 mile route. Checkpoints will be manned by non-riders. Cars equipped with two-way radios will be continuously patrolling the route, in direct contact with home-base, where, the St. John's Ambulance will be stationed. The Park will also serve as home-base for the trucks which will be sent out to pick up anyone with problems. Sponsor sheets, along with maps and rules will be circulating in the area.

Teatime Topics

(CP) — Milk and milk products can make lovely, cool additions to summer meals and parties.

Two desserts that everyone in the family should enjoy are suggested by the Canada department of agriculture.

The first is a chocolate sponge made with: 1 envelope unflavored gelatin, 2 cups milk, ½ cup sugar, ½ teaspoon salt, 4 beaten egg yolks, one 6-ounce package of semi-sweet chocolate

pieces, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 4 egg whites, ¼ cup sugar.

Sprinkle gelatin over milk and let stand to soften. Add ½ cup sugar, salt and egg yolks and chocolate pieces. Stir and cook until gelatin is dissolved, chocolate is melted and mixture is slightly thick (about 8 minutes). Remove from heat and beat to blend in chocolate. Stir in vanilla.

Chill until slightly thick, stirring occasionally. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Gradually add ¼ cup

sugar and continue beating until peaks form. Fold egg whites into chocolate mixture. Turn into dish and chill until firm. Serves six.

A Variation — Another sponge, make with rhubarb, calls for: 2 cups rhubarb in 1-inch pieces, 1/3 cup sugar, 1½ envelopes unflavored gelatin, 1½ cups milk, ½ cup sugar, ½ teaspoon salt, 4 beaten egg yolks, 1½ teaspoon vanilla, 4 egg whites, ¼ cup sugar.

Cook rhubarb until tender and add 1/3 cup

sugar and cool. Sprinkle gelatin over milk and let stand to soften. Add ½ cup sugar, salt and egg yolks. Stir and cook until gelatin is dissolved and mixture is slightly thick. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Stir rhubarb into egg mixture and chill until slightly thick.

Beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Gradually add ½ cup sugar and continue beating until stiff peaks form. Fold egg whites into rhubarb mixture. Turn into dish and chill until firm.

Makes 6 servings.

Try a Dip — A cheese dip with a difference is made with: 1 cup (4 oz.) finely grated cheddar cheese, 1 cup dairy sour cream, 1 teaspoon soy sauce, 1 teaspoon curry powder, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 1½ cups toasted slivered almonds.

Combine ingredients. Chill. Serve with crackers. Makes about 1 cup.


