SS Budget Set At \$1,884,375 legislative grant has been increased from \$1,090,248 last year to \$1,168,237 this year the levy to ratepayes will decline by \$1,600

leaving a total of \$621,686 to be raised. Only slight changes will be made in the mill rate of separate school supporters. Other revenue for the board declined by \$4,900 leaving a total of \$74,452

for this year. The increase in the budget means a percentage; increase of revenue of 3.84

Levies for the 28 municipalities in the two counties are as follows:

In other business the board passed a resolution supporting the Teacher's Federation stand that teachers should be exempt from unemployment
