Mr. Stanley said the present bylaw would require a hearing by the Ontario

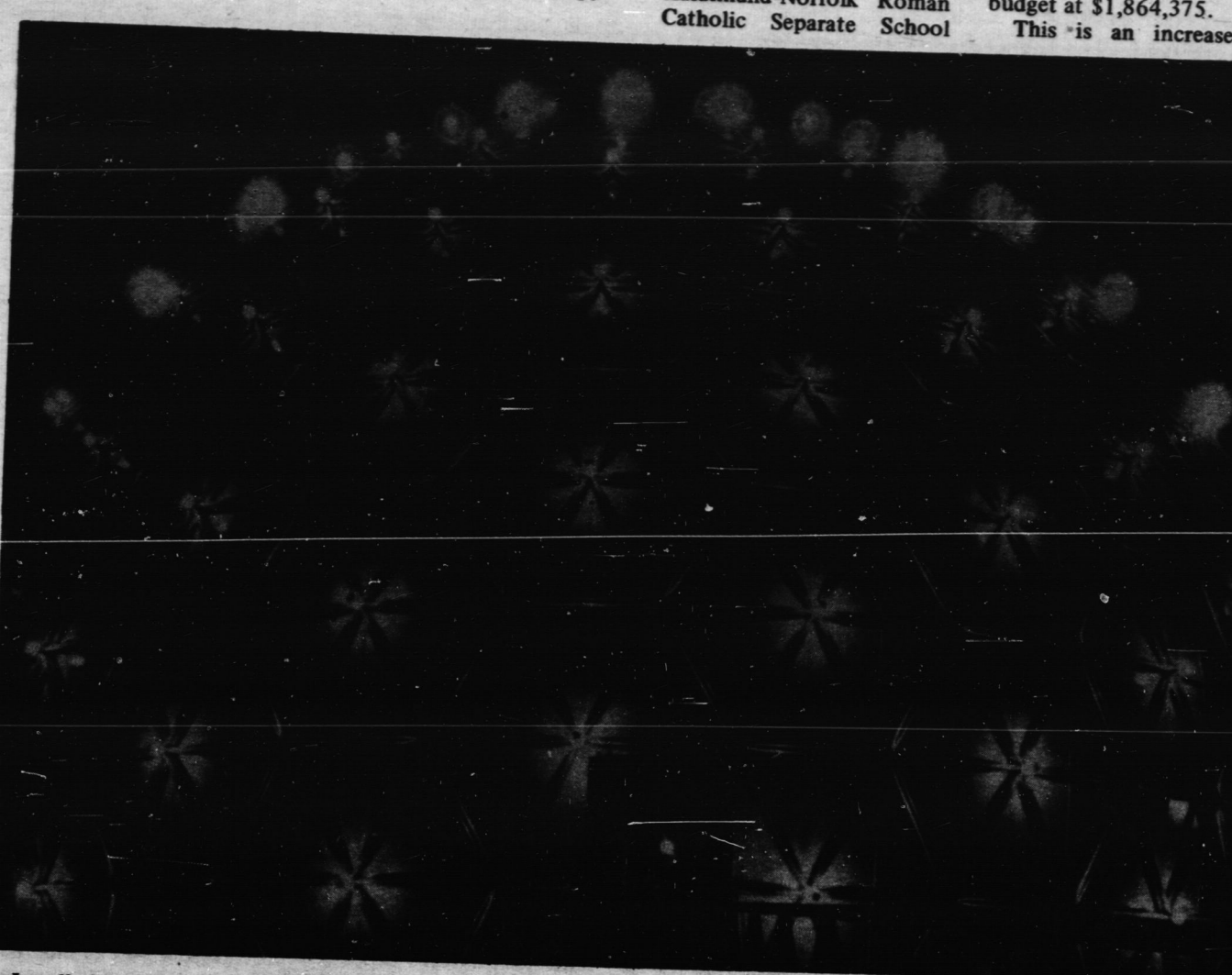

Cottage Owners Required To Pay For Road

PORT DOVER — Cottage owners here will have to pay for their own road.

This was the decision of council who heard complaints from land owners of Concession 1 of Woodhouse that their roadways were not plowed free of snow this winter.

Charles Driscoll, lawyer representing Louis Boyak of RR 2, Port Dover, one of the cottage owners, told council it would cost \$2,900 to bring the road up to specifications required for the township to take over the road.

He said the owners would rather look after the cost of upkeep of the road

themselves than pay for the necessary improvements.

Reeve John Pow told council he had received complaints from people on the road but that it wasn't in shape to be taken over by the township.

Mr. Boyak said the main concern of the owners on the road is that they are paying taxes like everyone else but the road is not plowed in the winter.

Reeve Pow said the taxes paid by ratepayers in the township are for township properties and projects but this particular road doesn't fall in that category.

He said if the road was brought up to the necessary

specifications the township would gladly take over responsibility for it.

Township Solicitor Robert Stanley told the council there were alternatives that could be

used by the owners such as the road allowance be bought by the township and improvements made under local improvements, which

SS Budget Set At \$1,884,375

DELHI — The Haldimand-Norfolk Roman Catholic Separate School Board has set its 1971 budget at \$1,864,375. This is an increase of

\$71,416 but because the legislative grant has been increased from \$1,090,248 last year to \$1,168,237 this year the levy to ratepayers will decline by \$1,600 leaving a total of \$621,686 to be raised.

Only slight changes will be made in the mill rate of separate school supporters.

Other revenue for the board declined by \$4,900 leaving a total of \$74,452 for this year.

The increase in the budget means a percentage increase of revenue of 3.84 percent.

In other business the board passed a resolution supporting the Teacher's Federation stand that teachers should be exempt from unemployment insurance contributions.

Business Administrator Herman Thournout told the meeting it would cost an additional \$8,000 a year for employer contributions if teachers are made to take part in the plan.

Superintendent L. L. Begley urged board members to support the resolution further by writing government officials and the unemployment insurance commission to register their objections.
