## REPORT

## Haldimand County High School Teachers Attend Professional Development Day

Teachers from Haldimand County attended a symposium on drugs at Haldimand High School on Feb. 22, 1971. The purpose of the symposium was to inform and enlighten school teachers of the drug abuse in the county, to visual aids available to them and how they might be implemented in the classrooms. There were over 100 teachers in attendance, Caledonia, Cayuga, Hagersville and Hagersville.

The morning speaker was Mr. Ray Johnson, professor of the school of physical education, McMaster University.

He suggested that teachers have to increase their knowledge and have their attitudes to change. As teachers we have very little. He believes preventive rather than curative knowledge of drugs should be taught at elementary school level, because change

takes so long, students should be aware of drug existence from grade one.

Mr. Johnson felt there were several reasons for the drug habit today. Among them he stressed the present grading systems in schools, the seemingly necessity to attend college, and the failure that has to be accepted by those who are not scholastically or psychologically able to compete.

He suggested that teachers could help in such ways as the following to relieve pressure on the student.

1) Give students pre-tests before lessons or promotion begins.

2) Students have individual time tables.

3) Teacher and student should determine their needs together.

4) Let the student select his own methods of style of learning.

The teacher monitors the students' style.

Mr. Johnson believes that teachers can be an

important factor in controlling the youth drug habit, but only when they have a great deal of knowledge and understanding of psychological, environmental and social factors involved.

The speaker is a valued member of the addiction research speakers' bureau. His address exemplified his experience of working with youth in health education and specialized study in the field of addiction.

The afternoon speaker at the symposium on drugs at the Caledonia High School was Dr. W. Landers, a member of the Caledonia Medical Centre.

Dr. Landers presented to the group a clinical, statistical approach to the youth culture that has doubled twice yearly since 1960.

He felt that actually alcohol abuse was by far the number one offender.

He enumerated many soft drugs and the percentages of use in areas

such as London, Toronto and other cities. The speaker suggested that physicians should be stricter in their prescriptions, pharmacists in handling prescriptions and manufacturing companies for producing such quantities.

He described the affects that drugs may have on the human mind and body. He explained how difficult it is to decide the exact effects, when conflicting results are published by authoritative sources.

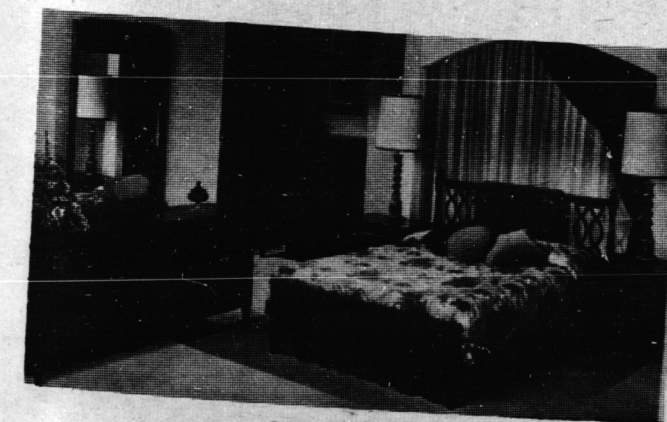
