**Farming Not Profitable**

Farming is a depressed industry, an industry in which even the most efficient farmers cannot make acceptable returns on their investments.

This was the major theme in a brief presented April 28, to Prime Minister William Davis and his cabinet, by the Ontario Federation of Agriculture. "The result," OFA President Gordon Hill told the government ministers, "is that the more educated farmers, the farmers with greater skills, leave farming for more rewarding opportunities. Unfortunately, those left in farming are the less able, the less well-trained and, certainly not in the best interests of Ontario at large, the less efficient food producers."

"Responsibility for the poor returns in agriculture rests with the Ontario government," Mr. Hill said. "It has permitted the relatively disorganized groups - farmers and pensioners in particular - to sink into poverty."

**W. Clarence Eaket Winner Of "Lamp Of Learning Award"**

An Ironbridge, Ontario man was today singled out by the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation for his outstanding contribution to education.

W. Clarence Eaket was named winner of the 1971 annual "Lamp of Learning Award" at a special luncheon for the Executive Council of OSSTF held at the Westbury Hotel in Toronto.

The award is given to a person, a non-teacher, who is judged to have contributed most to secondary school education during a period of one year or over a period of several years.

Mr. Eaket recalls the exact date on which he first became involved with education; it was the day his son Lyle was to face a particularly difficult chemistry exam, June 23, 1951.

He was planting flowers in his front garden when he was approached by a long time friend and area board member, A. H. McCabe and asked to run for a position on the local board. He did and a career that has lasted 20 years began.

On looking back he says, "there have been times when I wished that I had been planting those bulbs somewhere around Hudson Bay."

In the beginning years, Mr. Eaket rose through the ranks of trustees and today holds a prominent position with the Ontario School

Trustees' Council. He was elected to the council in 1965 and since 1968 he has served as an executive member of that body. He is also a trustee with the North Shore Board of Education and was named chairman of the board in January of this year.

In an interview, Mr. Eaket voiced surprise on hearing that he had been selected this year's winner. He said, "I had no idea I had been nominated for the Lamp. I guess over the years I have been involved and paying no attention to it. Somebody had to do the work."

In 1956 Mr. Eaket was chairman of the consultative committee from which the Blind River High School District was formed and he is regarded by many in that area as the man who built the high school in Blind River. He is credited with conceiving the idea, directing the construction and giving the school to the community. As chairman of the board of the Blind River District High School from 1956-1968, his board also

administered Elliot Lake Secondary School. During this period a second high school was built at Elliot Lake and both high schools became fully composite, partly under his board, partly under the High School Board of Elliot Lake.

Mr. Eaket's name was selected from a long list of applications by the Lamp of Learning Award Committee. The committee is chosen each year by OSSTF and consists of a member of a university staff, a member of the Home and School Association, representatives of the media and the business community as well as an OSSIF executive member.

The Federation distributes more than 2,300 nomination forms a year to school boards, trustee organizations, service clubs, municipal bodies, educational authorities and secondary school staffs.

In 1970 the award was presented to Mrs. Lillian Berg of Vermilion Bay, Ontario in recognition of her efforts over a period of

40 years to encourage area Indian children to continue their education.

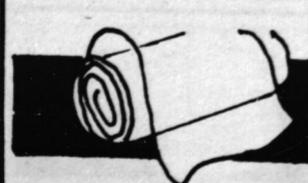

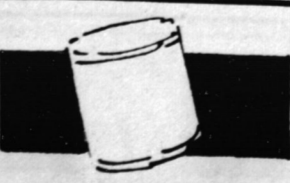
