

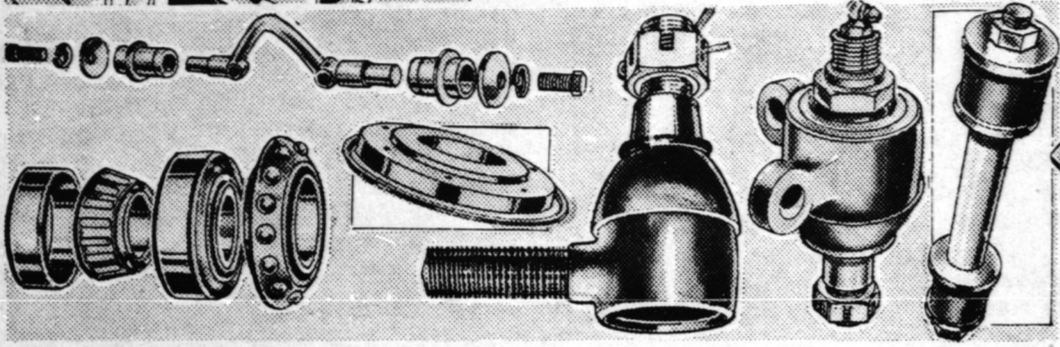

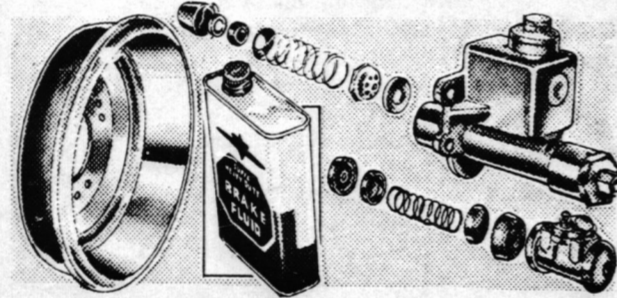

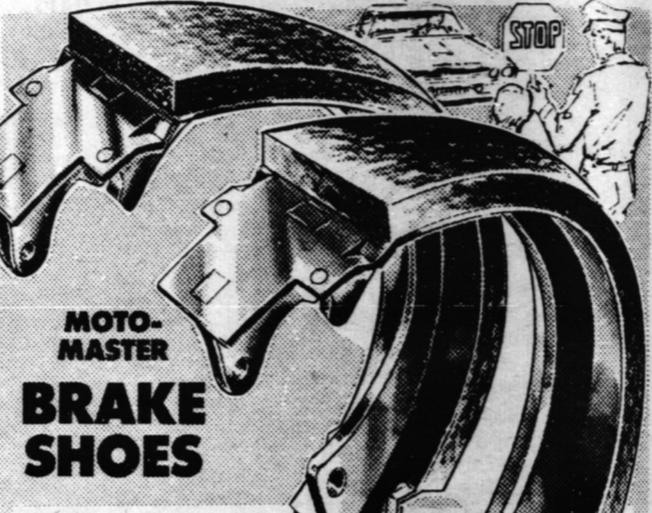

Peter Myke, chairman of the committee, said, the committee had to make up a deficit of \$380 as well as pay for trophies for last year's championship teams.

He asked council for an increase of \$641 in the \$3,700 budget.
