the lake until the 1970's, are the Ontario Water Resources Commission, Lands and Forests, Hydro, Stelco and Inco.

Ontario Hydro is contributing \$100,000 towards the cost of the survey. Stelco and Inco are spending \$100,000 each on the project.

When the entire study program is finished, the study group will have a survey of the Nanticooke area both before and after the building of the facilities. This will show the effect, if any, of the installations on the environment.

Ontario Hydro will be installing some boiler systems May 14 at the Nanticooke

Station, and a cloud of white smoke rising from the stack will be visible to area residents.

The "smoke test" of the boiler systems is the final step in the preparations for the first fire in the project's first furnace in August of this year.

If this is successful, Hydro expects one section of the huge plant to be in operation by the end of the year.

The total estimated cost of the Nanticooke Generating Station is \$678 million. The last of the eight units to be installed for service will be in 1977, when it is hoped the plant will be totally operable.

The status report on the environmental studies was

outlined by Dr. W. R. Effer, head of Hydro's generating concept department. He gave the details on the types of tests and results on environment in this area and elsewhere which apply to Nanticooke.

A. W. Rogers, manager of engineering at the station, gave a history of and introduction to the lake studies.

Dr. Effer said in five years after the plant is operating, the anti-pollution devices and precautions taken by the industries prove to be ineffective, other steps will have to be taken to alleviate the problem.

- By involving local teenagers in a constructive project.

- By combining teenagers with difficulties with others within their age range able to help them.

- By employing students within their field of study.

- By maintaining a negative pressure toward the use of alcohol and drugs.

YOUNG PEOPLES' INVOLVEMENT

- The planning thus far has been done by young people.

- These same people will continue supervision and planning of the project.

- Although objective professional evaluation will be done, the planning group will also use available records to do their own evaluation.

- Employment of full time students from a community college and local high school.

- This is an experimental project to determine the need in the community.

- Following evaluation, should it be determined that a continuing need exists, we would hope to extend the length of the project.

- Two community college students will be employed full time.

- Six high school students on a part-time basis, as supplementary assistants.

- One part-time bookkeeper.

- We project that approximately 350 members of the high school population will make use of this center. Many of these people will be drawn from the surrounding townships and local Six Nations Reserve. These areas are all included in the school population.

FINAL REPORT

- We plan to use records kept regularly by the staff during the summer, of use of center, age of participants, frequency of use, etc.

- Professional people who are involved in community development, "Y" work and social services will be asked for objective evaluation. Staff will prepare their own evaluation as will the present planning group.

MONEY

- We plan to ask the municipal office to supervise the disbursements of funds through the municipal staff.

- A student in the commercial section of the local high school will keep the books on a regular basis. These books will be audited at the end of the experiment for presentation to the department.

- No money is presently available and we would be in need of half of the grant by May 1, 1971.
