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# Sports Camera

(CP) — Hank Aaron has hit his 600th home run but as usually seems to be the case the feat was acknowledged with little fanfare.

To begin with, Willie Mays — appropriately enough — was there to steal some of Aaron's thunder.

Aaron's Atlanta Braves lost to San Francisco Giants 6-5, on Willie Mays' 10th inning single.

"I was looking forward to hitting it in a winning game," said Aaron.

But nevertheless Aaron joins the select club of 600 home run hitters. His mark is exceeded only by Babe Ruth, with 714, and Mays' himself with 633.

But Aaron continues to be perhaps, one of the most underrated players in the majors.

As one sports writer puts it: "If Hammerin' Hank had played in New York rather than Atlanta his name would be splashed with great regularity in headlines across the country."

Yet, consider these facts: Sandy Koufax calls him the best hitter in baseball; Red Schoendienst: hails Hank as the best right-handed hitter he's ever seen and Bobby Bragan calls Aaron not only the best hitter but the best player in baseball.

So where does Aaron go from here?  
Hank is 36 and, with a little luck, he could spend another four years in the major leagues.

Could he ever get the remaining 114 homers to tie Babe Ruth's record?  
He started the 1970 season with 554 homers, and he then needed an average of a little better

than 40 a season for the next four years to go over the top. But his 1970 output was only 38.

And Hank admits "There are some things I used to do that I can't do any longer. I just feel it."

He says he doesn't want to be in the game after he's lost his touch.

"There's no sense being embarrassed. If you can't compete with the other guys, there's no sense going out there."

Speaking of Ruth's record, Aaron says: "It's

hard to compare Ruth's record with anything since that time because the structure of baseball has changed so much.

"We play a game in Atlanta one day then fly to the coast to play Los Angeles. This has to be something out of a baseball player's career."

It would be pretty hard to evaluate the two records. Nevertheless Aaron, now, deserves more plaudits than baseball fans are prepared to give him.
