**Census Will Inventory An Estimated 500,000 Businesses**

Census of Canada, primarily concerned with people, housing and employment, will also be taking an inventory of all wholesale and service establishments across

Name and address.  
Whether retail, wholesale or service business.

A brief description of the type of business.

Numbers of personnel.  
Whether space is leased out to other businesses.

Anyone owning or operating a business in one of three categories - retail, wholesale or service - will be included in the first time national services such as accountants, lawyers, engineers, etc. are included - can call for a Census questionnaire during the week of May 25 to May 29. An interview will take place at the business, however, details will be as follows:

The purpose of this inventory: to establish, by size and kind of business, an up-to-date list of about 300 kinds of business for the more detailed Census of Merchandising and Service Businesses, which will be taken by mail questionnaires at the end of the year.

When the final tally is made, it is expected that some 500,000 businesses in

the three categories will have been listed across Canada, ranging from the corner store to the largest of the retail chain outlets and including thousands of one-man or one-women operations.

Most retail, wholesale and service establishments will be easily identified.

Retail stores include those establishments selling to the general public for household or personal consumption, together with such classes of business as gasoline stations, opticians, co-operative stores, and appliance stores operated by public utilities.

Wholesalers are classified as those who handle goods between the manufacturer and the retailer or

commercial user. Also included are co-operative marketing associations and buyers of farm or primary products, commodity brokers, petroleum bulk tank stations, and others.

The service group is an ever-growing one. There are the personal service establishments such as barbers, beauticians, dry cleaners, funeral parlors; business services such as management consultants, advertising agencies, credit and collection agencies, and the newer services such as computer services. Hotels, motels, restaurants, taverns, photographic studios, theatres, bowling alleys are included.

The identifying and listing of business

establishments in the three categories likely will present the Census Representative with some initial problems, particularly in view of what is thought to have been a large growth in recent years in business conducted out of the home.

The problem becomes somewhat more complicated at the wholesale level with its thousands of one-man or family operations in which the home is the office. These variously describe themselves as jobbers, agents, brokers, importers, or exporters. Then there are the businesses located in apartment blocks which can be easily overlooked, some that are located in office buildings with the owner

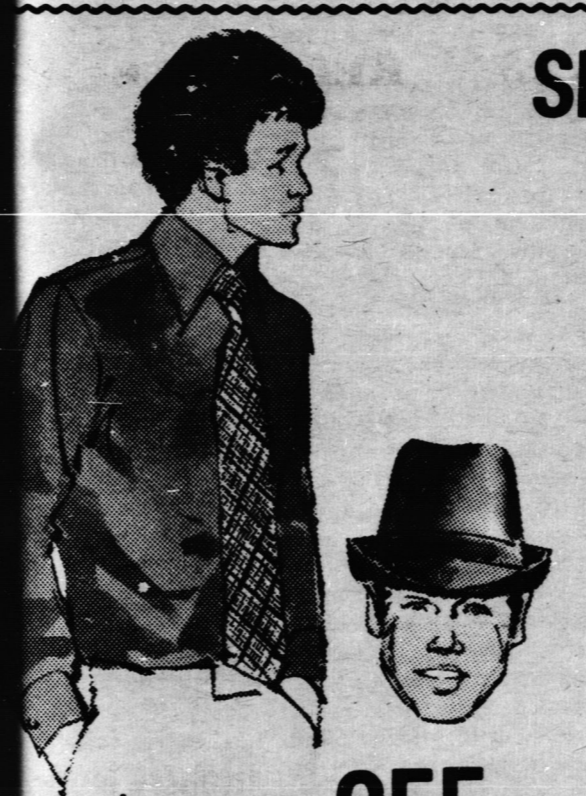
often on the road, and the many different types of service enterprises that have developed since the 1966 Census of Merchandising.

The Census Representative in some instances will therefore have to put a good deal of time and effort into identifying and listing every operation in the three categories to assure full coverage in the ensuing Census of Merchandising and Service Businesses.

The importance of this census is highlighted by the fact that at last estimate wholesale, retail and service establishments accounted for 25 percent of the Gross Domestic Product. The 1971 figures could show this to be higher.

**Poison Control**



WINNIPEG (CP)—The doctor in charge of the greater Winnipeg poison control centre says many cases of child poisoning could be prevented if parents would pay a penny extra for some medicines.

Dr. Vera Gellman, a pediatrician who has directed the poison control centre since 1959, says the cent is the extra cost of safety palm and twist vials

for dry medicines that require a combination of strength and co-ordination to open. The doctor says that since most cases handled by the centre at Winnipeg children's hospital involve medicines and children, many could be avoided if children couldn't get at the assorted pills found in everyday use in the home. Dr. Geilman and other

physicians would like to see pharmacists and drug manufacturers take a greater interest in poison prevention by making safety containers universal in use. They suggest that the slight additional cost is well worth the safety factor.

taking pills because it gives the curious child an example to follow.

The children's hospital centre is regarded as one of the best in the country, although it works with but two part-time people, Dr. Gellman and her secretary. The key to success is volunteer help, doctors on staff, police officers and the 999 emergency telephone number.

The federal food and drug directorate recently asked the drug industry to use safety packaging as a means of reducing the estimated 50,000 poison cases involving children last year in Canada.
