National Hockey League playoffs continued well into May again this season. The NHL board of governors should come up with an arrangement to end them by the end of April before the temperature

reaches the 70s and people start losing interest. Maybe just the first-place teams in each of the NHL's eligible for post-season play. This would shorten the

playoffs and also lend greater importance to the regular season. If the governors feel playoffs are necessary to keep up interest among the

then they should reduce the length of each individual

and semi-finals should be best-of-five affairs, instead of best of seven. This undoubtedly would shave a couple of weeks of the playoff schedule.

Owners in all sports realize they can fill their stadiums, parks and areas for post-season play.

But one day this strategy might backfire. FAns might begin to realize that all too often playoffs are merely a gimmick to raise money and often lack deep significance.

Boston Bruins, for example, were a far superior hockey team this season to Montreal Canadiens. Yet the Bruins were finished for the playing in the finals against Chicago Black Hawks.

Does this mean that the Canadiens are a better Bruins? Probably not, as regular season competition shows. Baseball which staved
