Fort York in Toronto when its staff prepares lunch for visitors. They sometimes offer pioneer fare that includes soup, bread and dessert.

Pea Soup - A pioneer-style split pea and ham soup calls for: 1 cup dried split peas, 1 ham bone, 1 medium onion chopped, ½ cup chopped celery leaves, ½ teaspoon ground pepper, 1 small crushed bay leaf, pinch of savory, 2 teaspoons salt, 6 cups water.

Wash peas, drain and put in soup kettle with remaining ingredients. Cover and simmer 2 hours or until

peas are tender. Remove ham bone, clean off meat, chop it and put it back in the soup.

If you like the soup extremely smooth, you may put it through a sieve before you put ham back in it.

To make whole wheat bread with a recipe from about 1800, you: scald 3 cups of milk and pour into a large bowl with ¼ cup of brown sugar, 2 teaspoons of salt and 1 tablespoon of butter.

Cool and add 1 yeast cake (1 package of yeast) dissolved in ½ cup of lukewarm water. Use a teaspoon of sugar to work the yeast.

Sift in enough whole wheat (stone ground if possible) flour to make a stiff dough.

Knead smooth and set to rise in a warm place. When double in bulk, turn onto a floured board and knead again. Shape into loaves and set to rise again. Bake in a brick bake oven, moderately warm, for about 45 minutes.

Gingerbread - Gingerbread made from century-old recipe calls for 1 cup butter, 1 cup brown sugar, 2 cups flour, 6 eggs, 1 cup of buttermilk, ginger and cinnamon to taste (about 2 teaspoons of each), 1 dessert spoonful of soda.

Combine dry ingredients, then mix in the liquids and beat it well. Bake at about 300 to 350 degrees for an hour. Will make about three average 9 x 9 inch cakes.

## Preparing for outdoor living

Outdoor living can be fun but it does take a little time to get everything in the patio clean, bright and ready for use.

THE first warm touches of summer are here and we can look forward to the pleasant days and evenings we will be spending in the garden or patio.

What about the barbecue and furniture we stored away last fall? Does it need any attention before we can use it? Here are a few tips that will make your outdoor furniture and equipment look like new.

Let's take a look at the barbecue. Removing grease from the grill is a really messy job, but to make things easier rub with a compound — such as Boraxo hand soap — in the hottest water available. This cuts grease and helps get the grill clean without too much

hard scrubbing. If the grill is very rusty, it's best to use a commercial rust remover before washing.

To freshen painted patio furniture, wash it with a solution using one teaspoon of ammonia, two ounces of borax and two quarts of water — no soap is necessary. Apply the solution with a soft cloth or sponge; it requires no rinsing. You may also use this solution to wash the painted enamel portion of the barbecue and hood.

Canvas and plastic covered chairs and lounge sets can also be washed.

First, check the canvas for stains and spots and pre-treat them by wetting the area with cold water and rubbing the spot with an additive like Bora-

teem. Then wash the canvas with warm water and detergent or soap.

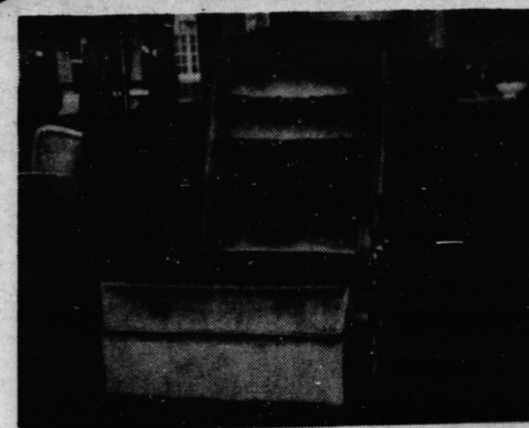
Plastic furniture can be scrubbed with soapy water and a cup of borax. This will remove the dust and bring out the bright colours in the plastic. This method can also be used for plastic umbrellas, hammocks and many other items of patio and garden furniture.

To remove that musty storage smell from ratan furniture and unpainted picnic tables and chairs, scrub them with Borateem and hot water. And the same technique can be used to clean other wicker work, such as flower baskets.
