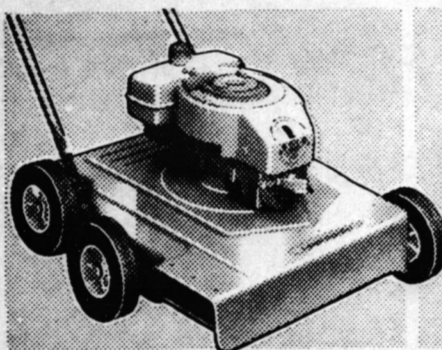

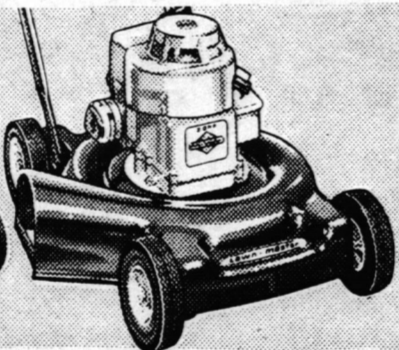

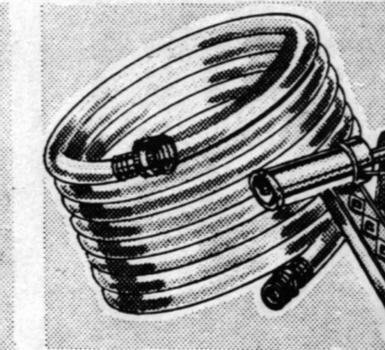

Use More 'Socially Acceptable Drugs' In Haldimand

In fact, use of most of these drugs tended to be lower in Toronto than in the other two areas surveyed, the report said. The foundation was reporting the results of a questionnaire filled out anonymously by 3,507 students in Haldimand County schools last December and some months earlier by teenagers in Niagara Falls and Toronto. Marijuana use was reported by 10.4 percent of the Haldimand students, compared with 12.4 percent in Niagara Falls and 18.3 percent in Toronto. Haldimand County also had slightly higher rates for barbiturates, and stimulants.

Rain Cancels Most Of Celebrations

JARVIS - All events scheduled for May 24 were cancelled because of a downpour of rain with the exception of the parade. The participants in the parade, despite the cloudburst, made their way over the scheduled route. Many of the costumes, after the drenching, had colors running from one portion to another. Even some 40 horses in the parade didn't appreciate the rain as they snorted and pawed their way over the route. The bands - all three of them - kept up spirits with good music and a hope that the rain would go away. The deluge didn't discourage the crowd. An estimated 3,000 people lined the streets. Many viewed the parade from cars parked at various vantage points. The sponsors, Lions Club of Jarvis, waited until it seemed most unlikely that the weather would clear before calling off the other events scheduled for the celebration. However, it was decided that fireworks, the amateur contest, the ball games, and other feature events would be rescheduled for June 19.

Judge Mark Girard commented when dismissing the case: "I suppose the effect of acquitting this case will enlarge or extend future use of lake shore homes. However, I think this is a non-conforming case," he said. In two days of trial Mr. Fleet and other witnesses testified that the building, in which he lives, is winterized and completely serviced for normal home use. Defence Council Edward McCarthy, Hagersville, told the court there were discrepancies between the bylaws and the standards at Mr. Fleet's residence. Howard Nicklin, president of the Walpole Township Citizen's Action Association which is vitally interested in the case, told The Record many people have constructed buildings along the lake shore, which they intend to live in all year round when they retire or as secondary and even primary homes. These homes were constructed under all regulations required for permanent homes. Township bylaws, however, restrict the area as a cottage zone and consider all residences in this area as cottages and subject to the zoning bylaw," he said.
